On that day in 1875, St. Michael's Mission House opened its doors in Steyl, Netherlands, paving the way for our global missionary work. St. Arnold, our father and founder, faced enormous challenges as he worked to build up our Arnoldus missionary family. 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## New SVD Candidates Begin at DWC

We caught up with Tai Van Truong to see how he's settling in. Tai grew up in north-central Vietnam, where he loved going to church to pray as a child. He even dreamed of becoming a priest—until life took him in other directions during high school and college. In 2021, he earned a degree in domestic tourism, but like many of us, the pandemic caused him to rethink things. While staying home, that old dream of priesthood reignited, and Tai joined the SVD postulancy.

"There were so many times I wanted to give up because I felt I wasn't deserving of God," Tai shared. "I prayed a lot, asking, 'Why me? There are so many others who are more talented and holy than I am.'" But each time he struggled, Tai said he heard a voice deep within his soul, reminding him, "Be strong, you can do it." That reassurance kept him going.

Now, Tai's made a big leap—literally! He's moved to the United States to study English at Divine Word College and continue his formation. He says the beauty and peacefulness of the campus took him by surprise. "What really stands out to me is how respectful, patient, kind, and friendly everyone is," Tai said. "I hope to nurture my dreams here and accumulate the necessary experience and knowledge to equip myself for future missionary work."

This well-treasured Vietnamese proverb means, “When you eat the fruit, remember those who planted the tree.”

## Faith and Family: A Legacy of Giving

When Quy Le arrived in the U.S. in 1998, he couldn’t speak English, but his parents’ steadfast guidance and strong faith helped him overcome the challenges of adapting to a new life. His family regularly attended monthly Masses at St. Matthew Parish in Cedar Rapids, where Vietnamese Divine Word Missionaries served their community. Quy recalls these moments as pivotal in his journey, feeling the warmth of belonging and the strength of his faith through his family’s participation.

Quy’s parents, both educators in Vietnam, instilled in him the importance of education and faith. Although he admits he wasn’t the top student, their unwavering support and encouragement taught him the value of perseverance.

After graduating from Mount Mercy University, Quy moved to Wisconsin but never lost the deep connection his parents fostered with the Divine Word Missionaries. Their example of faith, dedication, and community involvement shaped Quy’s commitment to supporting missionary work.


In 2018, Quy and his wife, Mary, began their journey as benefactors of Divine Word College, inspired by

the influence of his parents. After talking with Development Director Fr. Linh Pham, SVD, they decided to contribute.

“God is good! Although we were not in a great financial position to start making a sizable donation, it was the right time and the right call,” Quy said. “We strongly believe that our opportunity to contribute is part of God’s plan, so we will continue to work hard in our lives to successfully complete the plan He has for us.”

Quy and Mary now take advantage of their companies’ Matching Gift Programs, doubling their contributions each year.

“I hope that with great educational programs and initiatives, Divine Word College will be able to help our current and future missionaries gain the knowledge needed to better share and explain the Word of God,” he said.



# BRIDGING CULTURES, *Serving Communities*

Divine Word College's mission goes beyond educating young men discerning religious life with the Divine Word Missionaries. The college also plays an important role in training ordained priests from around the world to learn English and prepare for service in English-speaking communities. In recent years, some of these priests have stayed right here in the Midwest, stepping into parish leadership roles and bringing their unique perspectives to local communities.

One such priest is Fr. Telesphore Dusabe from Rwanda, who was sent to the U.S. at the request of his home

diocese. He enrolled at Divine Word College to gain a deeper understanding of the U.S. Catholic Church, graduating in May 2024 with an associate's degree in Intercultural Studies. Fr. Telesphore now serves as pastor for five parishes in Iowa's Holy Rosary Cluster, which includes the communities of Alta Vista, Lourdes, Elma, Riceville, and New Haven.

"When I first arrived in the U.S., I struggled to understand and communicate in English. It felt as though I was watching a television program in a foreign language, unable to grasp anything being said," he



recalled. “However, Divine Word College took me from a place of confusion to a place of confidence. The college’s rigorous language program played a significant role in this transformation. Divine Word College equipped me with the skills and knowledge to thrive in a multicultural and intercultural community. The college not only improved my language skills but also enriched my understanding of cultural diversity, enabling me to serve my community more effectively.”

Just a few months into his assignment, Fr. Telesphore adapted to rural Iowa life, driving from parish to parish and embracing the close-knit community he serves. He praises the local people for their hospitality and support.

“Their acceptance and encouragement underscore the universal nature of the Catholic Church,” he said. “This assignment has been a blessing, providing me with a rich environment to deepen my understanding of the Church’s practices and to serve a vibrant parish community.”

Fr. Telesphore cherishes the quiet, family-like atmosphere of the towns, where strong bonds of mutual support create a setting ideal for reflection and ministry.

“My greatest joy comes from being with my parish community, celebrating Mass, visiting the elderly and the sick, and administering the sacraments,” he shared. “These moments allow me to connect deeply with the parishioners, offering spiritual guidance and support. The warmth and openness of the people here make my ministry incredibly fulfilling and meaningful.”

However, his journey hasn’t been without its challenges. Adapting to the English language—especially with his accent—posed a significant hurdle, but he approached it with determination.

“I focused on speaking slowly, clearly, and loudly during my sermons and interactions,” he said. “I sought feedback from my parishioners and colleagues, which helped me identify areas for improvement. By dedicating time and effort to improve my English communication skills, I have been able to connect

Frantz Augustin, originally from Haiti, who spent a year learning English in 2019 at DWC before earning a master’s degree in human resources management. Since 2022, he’s been serving three parishes in Greene, Rockford, and Roseville, Iowa.

Fr. Frantz fondly recalls his time at DWC, where he was part of a formation group led by College President Fr. Tom Ascheman, SVD. The group, composed of ordained priests, offered mentorship on everything from English pronunciation to parish ministry in the U.S.

“Divine Word College played a very important role and has become more of a home for me,” Fr. Frantz said. “I am so grateful to the school and to all the staff who showed me great love and support.”

Fr. Frantz’s parishioners have embraced him with warmth, just as they did for Fr. Telesphore.

Other Divine Word alumni are also making their mark in Midwestern parishes. Fr. Milot Frederique, SMM, another Haitian priest, serves as Parochial Vicar at St. Thérèse of Lisieux Pastorate in Wisconsin, while Fr. Kayiranga de Dieu Felix from Rwanda serves as an associate pastor in Cedar Rapids, Iowa.

Fr. Telesphore says his experience at DWC helped prepare him to serve as a parish priest in Iowa. The diverse environment at the college allowed him to learn and appreciate different cultures. As he looks to the future, he remains optimistic about his ministry in Iowa, eager to learn more about U.S. Catholic traditions and to continue growing his connection with his parish.

“My hopes for my ministry in Iowa are centered on spreading the Good News, improving my language skills, learning from the Catholic Church in the U.S., and fostering spiritual growth within my parish community,” he said. “With God’s grace, I am confident that these aspirations will lead to a fruitful and fulfilling ministry.”


# Campus Connections

# FINDING JESUS

*in every heart*

Originally from Oaxaca, Mexico, Frt. Rafa Yescas, SVD grew up in close connection with the Divine Word Missionaries since the congregation ran his home parish. His mother attended Bible-sharing sessions, and his family was deeply involved in their church community. At age 10, he joined the youth group and choir, solidifying his bond with the SVDs. As a teenager, he found support from the SVD Priests and SSPS Sisters when facing personal challenges. “It was amazing,” he said. “As a teenager, you need someone who can help you understand what’s happening in your life.”

By age 15, he began spiritual direction with a vocation director. Three years later, he faced a tough decision: study psychology or join the SVDs. Frt. Rafa chose to continue discerning his call to missionary life. In 2017, he moved to Guadalajara to study philosophy, followed by a novitiate year in Oaxaca during the pandemic. He then studied theology in Mexico City and professed First Vows in 2021.

During his formation, Frt. Rafa worked with young people in a community where drugs and violence were part of their everyday life. He didn’t just want to teach them, but to help them develop a relationship with Jesus. By the end of his time there, several young people told him they had discovered Jesus. This experience confirmed for Frt. Rafa that he wanted to help others in the same way as a Divine Word Missionary Priest.


Now at Divine Word College in Iowa, Frt. Rafa is learning English in preparation for his upcoming Cross-Cultural Training Program in Jamaica. “Being here has helped me learn how to deal with and be patient with people from different cultures and mindsets,” he said.

Frt. Rafa hopes to blend spirituality and psychology in his missionary work, helping people understand themselves and find healing. In Jamaica, he plans to assist with a food pantry, teach Spanish, and attend Bible-sharing sessions. He also hopes to inspire young people to consider religious life by showing them how to bring Jesus to others through their faith.

“People need someone to listen to them, especially now when the world is changing so much,” he said. “We need priests, sisters and brothers who are able to accompany people, see their wounds, help them heal and be the presence of Jesus in their lives.”

## Celebrating Vocational Milestones

### Former Students Advance in Religious Formation

This summer, four young men entered the year-long novitiate program with the Divine Word Missionaries in Chicago. This phase of formation is an important time for reflection and growth, allowing the novices to further understand their calling, deepen their relationship with God, and learn about the history and charism of the SVD community.

Another group of four men completed their own year of novitiate this summer and took the next step in affirming their commitment to missionary service in the Church when they professed First Vows as Divine Word Missionaries.

Finally, September marked a momentous occasion as six young men professed their Perpetual Vows, followed by ordination to the diaconate. These men now eagerly prepare for their ordination to the priesthood, which is planned for May 2025.
