A Medal of Mary



The man considered the answer as his shoes started to gleam from the polish and the shine cloth. He said, "Why her medal? She's no different from your mother."

The boy answered, "Could be, but there's a real big difference between her son and me."

Last weekend during the double celebration of Our Lady of Guadalupe and the Immaculate Conception of Mary, a medal of Mary was given to each person. They were a gift from Dr. Richard Mani, an SVD alumnus who is now a generous benefactor of DWC. As the medals were distributed I couldn't help but think of St. Juan Diego Cuauhtlatoatzin, the Aztec man who was given a sign by Mary to carry to a skeptical bishop. As he hurried to the city, Juan Diego clutched some flowers to his chest, nestling them in his cloak. In the presence of the bishop, he opened the cloak and the image of Mary appeared draped across his chest.



In the final weeks of Advent the gospel readings will focus on two people: John the Baptist and Mary. John the Baptist proclaimed: I am not the Messiah; I am not fit to loosen his sandal strap. That sounds like the shoeshine boy's humble recognition that there was a real big difference between Jesus and him. As missionary disciples of Jesus, we also know that we are not the Light, we are not the Promised One; we are messengers, not the Messiah.



Mary heard a startling greeting from the angel – Hail Mary, Full of Grace. We can identify with Mary in her confusion. Together

with her, we wonder what the greeting could mean. Perhaps we are reminded that Grace is more original than any sin. Mary was not the Messiah either, but she accepted the risky grace of carrying the long-awaited Savior in her womb. And she praised God.

Tomorrow, Wednesday December 12 is the feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe. As missionaries, like Juan Diego, we too want to carry the Word of God written in bodies. Receiving communion brings us close to Mary, the Christ bearer. A medal of Mary can remind us of the incredible grace we too receive.

For anyone who would like to receive a medal of Mary please do stop down to see me so I can share Dr. Mani's gift with you.

Faculty Annual Performance Evaluations due 14 December 2018

In accord with the Faculty Handbook sections #230 and #260, Undergraduate and IELI faculty are reminded that self-evaluations and annual planning goals were due to the respective Chair/Director by 1 December. If necessary, faculty have some extra time to submit these documents but not later than 14 December 2018. The annual faculty performance evaluation requirement does not apply to adjunct faculty.

Student Course Evaluations

Students are strongly encouraged to do the course evaluations at the end of this semester/term. These course evaluations provide very important feedback regarding course effectiveness and student learning. The purposes of this process are stipulated in Faculty Handbook #603:

- [to] facilitate the routine evaluation of each course
- [to] encourage teaching staff to reflect on effective course design and delivery
- [to] provide a mechanism for students to provide feedback to enhance the quality of learning and teaching
- [to] collect information concerning the implementation of the Student Learning Outcomes
- [to] gather evidence that may be used to demonstrate quality teaching and curriculum design.

Students should view course evaluations seriously and take the opportunity to provide free and honest feedback. These evaluations are anonymous. No teacher will know your individual identity or comments, and the aggregated results can only be viewed after final grades are posted. Course evaluations for the Fall 2019 semester and the ESL Term B are available in Populi from Wednesday 12 December 2018 until Monday 17 December 2018.

Final Grades Due on 18 December 2018

Faculty are reminded that final course grades are due no later than 8:00 a.m. on Tuesday 18 December 2018. Instructors should finalize and lock their courses in Populi by this date/time, otherwise the Registrar will do so automatically.

Joint DTP & DIS Departmental Meeting on 9 January 2019

As noted in the VPAA memo dated 3 December 2018, Undergraduate faculty will begin the process of individual course mapping & bench-marking of the provisionally-approved Core Competency Student Learning Outcomes (CC-SLOs) in departmental meetings. In order to facilitate this process, the Department of Theology & Philosophy [DTP] and the Department of Interdisciplinary Studies [DIS] will hold a joint departmental meeting from 12:45 – 1:45 p.m. in Room 101 on Wednesday 9 January 2019. This joint meeting will allow for all Undergraduate faculty to receive the same instructions and guidance at the same time, with an opportunity for questions in common. As this is a regularly-scheduled departmental meeting for the beginning of the Spring 2019 semester, all DTP & DIS faculty will be required to attend. As usual, adjuncts are invited but not required to attend.

ESL Tutoring Orientation on 14 January 2019


