

Missionary Friendship

As we prepare to celebrate Mission Sunday, it is good to think about what we mean when talking about missionary activity. The fifth DWC core competency is: *missionary discipleship*. DWC understands this competency as reaching out in prophetic dialogue to the poor and marginalized, and faith-seekers of different cultures and faiths to share in the diversity of God's gifts in the tradition of SVD missionary service. That is quite a lot to take in all at once!

Geographic understanding of mission. It helps to make a comparison to an older view of missionary activity. Until the 1950's, missionary work was thought of in mostly geographic terms. Mission was a "place" where the Church was not fully established; Africa, Asia, and parts of Latin America. Europe and North America was for pastoral care, not for missionary work! Mission was understood as sending out church workers from Europe and North America to different parts of the world.

Interpersonal understanding of mission. In the 1990s and in the first decade of the 2000s, Divine Word Missionaries and Holy Spirit Missionary Sisters spent considerable effort to renew our understanding of missionary service in light of our practical experience. It was obvious to us that the Church was now well established in Africa, Asia, and certainly in Latin America. In fact, the majority of our members were coming from those parts of the world. As we worked to develop a renewed expression of missionary



service, the Holy Spirit Missionary Sisters began speaking of *building up life-giving relationships* while SVDs spoke of *prophetic dialogue*. Prophetic dialogue or life-giving relationships are missionary not because of where the encounter is taking place, but rather with whom! We

understand our mission, anywhere in the world, to be a dedication to: people seeking an experience of faith, to the poor and marginalized, to people of many cultures, and to people of other faith traditions.

Though this way of thinking about missionary activity may seem rather theoretical, we can easily translate it into some very practical ways of acting: Missionary Discipleship is about befriending people who are on the margins of Church and society. For instance, reaching out in friendship to Muslim neighbors is mission. Cultivating deeper relationships with people who consider themselves as agnostic or unchurched, even members of our own families, is mission. Reaching out across barriers of culture, race, class, language and way of life are all practical moments of missionary discipleship. These moments happen at Divine Word College every day. We are a missionary community.

As we celebrate Mission Sunday, look around and consider your friendships. Let us open our arms and hearts to welcome new, and unusual, friends into our lives.

Hospitality - We will have many guests for the Mission Sunday weekend - please show our guests the DWC hospitality.


