Missionary Roadblocks

We are back at DWC for the last eight weeks of the school year. During Spring Break travels, we may have run into roadblocks that delayed our journeys. Road construction, snowstorms, flat tires, and speed traps can all make driving a miserable experience.




Jesus' ministry involved a lot of traveling. In the coming weeks of Lent we will accompany Jesus to Jerusalem to be witnesses once again to his passing over. Before we go forward, I suggest we look back to the past Sunday's of Lent – taking special note of roadblocks Jesus encountered.

The **First Sunday of Lent** (Mat 4:1-11) recalls the beginning of Jesus' ministry, and the temptations that came just as he started out. The tempter came to him to see if there were some roadblocks he could put in place. He proposed abundant bread, spectacle at the temple, and unlimited power over the nations. Jesus turned them down.

How about us who share in Jesus' mission and journey to the Reign of God? We may experience some roadblocks like those the tempter brought to Jesus. Maybe we *collect too much stuff, grasp at fame, or fight for too much control*. All of that makes it very difficult to reach out in friendship to those we encounter in mission.

The **Second Sunday of Lent** (Mat 17:1-9) tells the story of Jesus' transfiguration. It was a beautiful and terrifying experience for Peter, James and John. Peter suggested they build three tents, one for Jesus, one for Moses and one for Elijah. Just six days earlier, Peter had said



that Jesus was the expected Messiah; but Peter did not want to hear Jesus talk about his approaching death and resurrection. Peter wanted to *stall in the glory of the Lord, delaying the necessary next steps.*

We can also stall in moments of glory, basking in moments of devotion, delighting in beautiful liturgy, and clinging to religious experience. It is good to savor such moments, but they are not the goal of our missionary journey. Our journey and our goal are well described in the motto we have taken for this Lent from the prophet Micah (6:8): "Do justice, love goodness, walk humbly with God." An uplifting Mass is useless if it does not result in loving and serving the Lord in the people we meet along the way.

The **Third Sunday of Lent** (John 4:5-42) focuses on the story of the Samaritan woman at the well of Jacob. It is one of my favorite passages. Toward the end of the account the woman is away in the town gathering the people to come and meet Jesus, while he is with the disciples that they might well find themselves reaping where others have planted the seed. I think the scene is comical; the *disciples are talking about mission while the woman is doing mission!*


A roadblock for us may be an attitude that we are "experts" in missionary outreach and so we are the ones to plant the seeds, to water the seedlings, to protect the plants from pests, to harvest the crop and to store it in barns! This mission possessiveness is a dangerous roadblock indeed. Pope Francis consistently alerts the Church to the dangers of clericalism. Mission always includes encouraging others to share in the work and the journey.

SVD's love a line from our Constitutions; Jesus' mission is our mission. Let us beware of the roadblocks that Jesus and his disciples encountered and be sure to move past them in our own day.

Tips to Stay Motivated in the Middle of the Semester


Women's History Month Display

Severe Weather Awareness:

We want to remind the DWC community of the actions you should take in case of a tornado. The following is from the DWC Policy Handbook: 5.08.02

When a tornado warning is announced over the Public Address system, go immediately to the basement corridor (near the east end).

Megan Hall residents go to the south end of the Megan Hall basement.

Arkfeld House residents go to the basement.

- Stay clear of windows.
- Gather in your formation group. (Employees gather together)
- Remain there until the "all-clear" signal sounds.

In addition to the above Public Address system announcement, DWC will send a text message through our Populi notification system. It is important that we have your current contact information in Populi. If you are unsure or if you recently added a new cell phone number, please contact Kimberly in the Registrar's Office. She will assist you with updating your contact information.

Every year in the United States, hundreds of people are killed and thousands injured because of severe weather. Dangerous weather can take many forms, ranging from violent tornadoes to crippling winter storms. With the notable exception of hurricanes, Iowa can experience any of these dangerous phenomena.

While there is nothing we can do to stop dangerous weather from affecting us, there are things we can do to stay safe. Weather safety and survival - no matter what the hazard - depends on the following key items:

- 1. KNOW THE HAZARDS Be aware of the hazards that you might face during a weather
- 2. KNOW WHEN TO EXPECT DANGEROUS WEATHER Monitor forecasts and information from your local National Weather Service Forecast Office.
- 3. PAY ATTENTION Be aware of all watches, warnings, and advisories affecting you.
- 4. HAVE A PLAN TO STAY SAFE Think about it before it happens and be ready to act to survive.

March 17- Movie night at 7:00 p.m. in the Pour House. We will show the film "She Said," a movie about the Me Too Movement.


Also, please check the TV monitors in the hallway. You will see a slide show depicting several notable women who have helped shape many sectors of society. We thank them for their many contributions!!
