

Something good from shingles

St. Paul assures us that “all things work for good for those who love God... (Rm. 8:28). Do you think anything good can come out of a shingles infection?

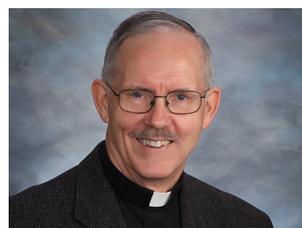
Shingles is a viral infection that causes a painful rash. It is triggered by the same virus that causes chickenpox. Like most people, I had chickenpox as a child and then the virus went dormant in me. Years later, a little more than four weeks ago, the virus started up again producing a rash on my forehead that slowly moved down toward my eye. Most times, shingles lasts for two to three weeks. For me, it seems it will last five to six weeks. At times, it has been very, very painful. All the nerves in the area feel like they are on fire. Now I am finally on the mend, and I am so grateful for that.



For me, the infection appeared just days before I had planned to be vaccinated. If you are already fifty years old, be sure to go and get the vaccine. It is 90% effective. (In most situations, shingles is not contagious. However, direct contact with the rash can cause chickenpox in those who have not already had the disease or the childhood vaccination.)

I would like to tell you about three things that have happened to me during my struggles over the past few weeks. I have found that even something as painful and discouraging as **shingles can bring some blessings.**

First, I am **hugely grateful to be part of our religious community** here at Divine Word College. My SVD confreres have been my main support, bringing me food and encouragement. They took me to the doctor and the pharmacy. Many took on extra work when I was unable to tend to my responsibilities as president. Students, faculty, staff and SVD s have assured me of their prayers, and they have offered greetings and best wishes as they begin to see me in the hallways once again.



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Second, I have experienced **some episodes of very intense pain**. For a space of several minutes, I would cry out from the pain, pacing back and forth, holding my head and begging that it would stop. One time our rector, and my good friend, Fr. Thang was with me when I suffered an attack. He could do nothing to shorten the episode nor to reduce the pain. But it was a genuine comfort that he stayed beside me, witnessing my suffering and my discouragement. That made me think about how Jesus must have been comforted by the presence of a few of his disciples and his mother in the midst of his passion.

There is another line from Paul's letters to the Colossians that comes to mind: *"I rejoice in my sufferings for your sake, and in my flesh I am filling up what is lacking in the afflictions of Christ on behalf of his body, which is the church..."* (Col 1:28). As it happens, the doctor who is helping me is a member of the parish in East Dubuque. His sixteen-year-old daughter, Isabella is suffering from a brain tumor. The doctor asked me to pray for his daughter through the intercession of Blessed Chiara Badano. I decided to dedicate any suffering that I might experience as a prayer for Isabella. I remember her daily. In moments of intense pain, I ask God to bring health and healing for Isabella.

Third, until the last couple of days, I haven't been able to see very well because the shingles infection affected my eye. I couldn't read or watch television. I could, however, listen to the Liturgy of the Hours on a smartphone app. When the nights are long and I cannot sleep, I am also praying along with **rosary meditations** on my phone. I have rediscovered a devotion that I first felt as a little child and have occasionally enjoyed at other times in my life. I remember something my grandmother told me. She said that if you start a rosary, and fall asleep, it is the job of your guardian angel to finish the prayers. I have been keeping my angel busy.

Registration for Undergraduate Spring 2020 Semester

Undergraduate student registration will take place from Wednesday, November 6 through Friday, November 8, 2019. All undergraduate students should schedule an appointment with their academic advisors to review their academic progress and to register for Spring Semester courses. Be sure to register on time; registration closes on Friday, November 8, at 3:00 p.m. Consult the course schedule published by the Registrar and plan your registration accordingly.

Higher Learning Commission Visit

Divine Word College is accredited by the Higher Learning Commission (HLC). As part of the normal reaffirmation of accreditation process, a team of four HLC peer reviewers will visit DWC on November 11-12, 2019. The HLC peer reviewers have read the Assurance Argument—published last month—and will verify that DWC is compliant with established standards in higher education. The final version of the Assurance Argument, with Introductory Statement, represents the collaborative efforts of faculty, staff, and administration who worked together to research and compose DWC's responses to the five criteria and twenty-one core components for accreditation.

While on campus, HLC peer reviewers will meet with various members of the administration, faculty, staff, and students. Watch the bulletin board for the visit schedule and notice of special open forums on each of the five criteria to which all faculty and staff are invited. There will also

be a special open forum for all students—all students are highly encouraged to attend. The open forums present opportunities for HLC peer reviewers to ask specific questions and solicit honest feedback from all members of DWC.

Please note: In order to accommodate attendance and meaningful participation of faculty and students in the open forums, it will be necessary to cancel one or more class periods on those two days. Also, any faculty member who is scheduled for a meeting with HLC peer reviewers during class time should reschedule or cancel that class and attend the HLC meeting which takes precedence. Once the HLC peer review team Chair finalizes the visit schedule, notice of class cancellations will be published.

ESL Student Opinion Survey

The Intensive English Language Institute recently conducted an ESL Student Opinion Survey of currently-enrolled students. A total of 37 students responded. The survey demonstrates overall strong student satisfaction with various aspects of the English as a Second Language program:

- 81% of ESL students like the 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. schedule
- 73% of ESL students like the 20-23 hours of instruction per week (some wanted more hours, some wanted less hours)
- 71% of ESL students like the distribution of class hours: 10 hours Grammar/Writing; 10 hours Communication; 2-3 hours Reading (a number of students expressed a desire for more reading hours)
- While 92% of ESL students think the promotion policy is fair, 35% of those students expressed a desire to understand that promotion policy better

Congratulations to Dr. Seo Hyun Park and all ESL instructors for their hard work and dedication in providing students with an excellent ESL program of which Divine Word College can be proud! The complete numerical survey results are appended to this issue of the LOG.

November 20 – Matthew 25 Celebration











Answered: 37 Skipped: 0



What ESL activities outside the class help you learn English? Choose all you like.


