We Shall Overcome

Yesterday, on Dr. Martin Luther King Day, Fr. Ky Dinh SVD shared a story of his life in the 1990's in Atlanta during the early days of his arrival in the United States. He was a student at a community college, and there he learned of the



history of slavery, of emancipation, and of the century of Jim Crow segregation that followed. He also read about the struggle for civil rights, coming to admire the leadership of Dr. King.



In August 1963 during a massive rally in Washington DC, when Rev. King gave his timeless I Have A Dream speech, folk-singer and social activist Joan Baez led the crowd of 300,000 people in that song. It filled the crowd with hope and courage for the ongoing struggle.



In our day, we await the inauguration of a new administration. President Biden and Vice-President Harris have identified "four overlapping and compounding crises" that challenge the people of the USA and other parts of the world: COVID, the economic

downturn, climate change, and racial justice. The future looks daunting, especially given the fear, violence and division evident in the nation.

In this week of prayer for Christian Unity, the overall theme is from John 15, the same text that inspires the mural in the main chapel at DWC. The Evangelist quotes Jesus: "I am the vine, you are the branches. Those who abide in me and I in them bear much fruit, because apart from me you can do nothing." **We need God's grace, and we need one another...** only then can we overcome someday.

Shortly before his assassination, Rev. King closed his sermon with the words of the song, "We shall overcome. We shall overcome. Deep in my heart, I do believe we shall overcome. And I believe it because somehow the arc of the moral universe is long, but it bends towards justice...."

Faculty Professional Development Annual Data Collection for Calendar Year 2020

Divine Word College encourages and facilitates ongoing professional development for instructional faculty. Indeed, ongoing professional development is necessary for faculty to maintain "a high level of subject matter knowledge and ensures that course content is current, accurate, representative, and appropriate to the position of the course within the student's program of studies." (DWC Policy Handbook 7.05.01) One criterion for accreditation by the Higher Learning Commission states: "The institution has processes and resources for assuring that instructors are current in their disciplines and adept in their teaching roles; it supports their professional development." (HLC Criterion 3.C.4)

Through the Office of the VP for Academic Affairs, the College provides ample opportunity and generous funding for faculty ongoing professional development both for internal events (Faculty Institute, Faculty In-Services, web-based training) and for participation in external events (professional conferences and workshops). Understandably, external opportunities have been severely limited due to COVID this past year.

In order to accurately document that all faculty are actively engaged in ongoing professional development activities, the VP for Academic Affairs Office compiles and publishes an Annual Report on Faculty Professional Development for submission to the Board of Administration and the Board of Trustees. All faculty, excluding adjuncts, are kindly requested to briefly list their professional development activities during calendar year 2020 (1 January – 31 December) using the six categories indicated below. If there was no activity in a particular category, simply write "nothing to report." A listing of Safe Colleges Training modules will be included for each member automatically. Please email your report to the Registrar, Ms. Kimberly Burnett-Hackbarth, no later than noon on Friday 5 February 2021. Thanks in advance for your collaboration.

Seasonal Affective Disorder

Seasonal affective disorder (SAD) is a type of depression that's related to changes in seasons. SAD symptoms can start in the fall and continue into the winter months, sapping your energy and making you feel moody.

Symptoms specific to *Winter-Onset SAD*, sometimes called *Winter Depression*, may include: Oversleeping, appetite changes, a craving for foods high in carbohydrates, weight gain, and tiredness or low energy.



Take signs and symptoms of seasonal affective disorder seriously. As with other types of depression, SAD can get worse and lead to problems. These can include: Social withdrawal, school or work problems, substance abuse, other mental health disorders such as anxiety or eating disorders, and suicidal thoughts or behavior.

Don't brush off that yearly feeling as simply a case of the "winter blues" or a seasonal funk that you have to tough out on your own. Take steps to keep your mood and motivation steady throughout the year. (*Adapted from: Mayo Clinic*)
