This year has been a particularly grief-stricken year for so many members of our community. I am not a counselor or psychologist, but I have a lot of experience with grief. I have had to take grief on my life's journey and learn to give it time and love. As hard as it seems to say, grief is a blessing. (For those of you that don't know me well, my Father, Mother, and husband, dearest David Carlock, all died in a span of 5 years. My son was 9 when his Dad had a massive stroke, and my son was 14 when his Dad died.)

First, let me tell you my favorite Good Friday poem. This poem was found on the wall of an ancient Irish monastery, the author is unknown.



The Crucifixion

At the cry of the first bird, They began to crucify thee, Oh, Lord.

Never shall lament cease because of that, It was like the parting of day from night.

Ah, sore was the suffering borne, By the body of Mary's son.

But, sorer still to him was the grief; Which for his sake, Came upon his Mother.

This poem gives the stark human reality of Christ's Crucifixion. He was human. He had friends, a mother, and a father. A mother lost her son. As real today as it has been for 3000 years, we lose loved ones. It is an unspeakable loss to lose those who loved us and knew us best. Grief is difficult but it is not our enemy. Grief is our friend, reminding us that we were greatly loved and greatly blessed. Tears are nothing to be ashamed of. Every phrase and word of comfort; from my friends, students, colleagues, and family; are all really saying, "I love you." And, to this day, that makes me cry tears of joy. These tears are not tears of sorrow; they are a blessing.

Remember, after Christ's torture and death, we say "Alleluia." Sometimes, on the day after Good Friday, that seems crazy. It seems too soon. But, it isn't. We are left on earth for a reason. "Alleluia" is how to go forward. Our lost loved ones want us to live every minute, love, laugh, and enjoy the rest of our journey. It is not easy; it is the hardest thing to do. But, all of life's most important things to do, are also the hardest things to do. To my beloved friends, I want to say, "I'm sorry." I also want you to take an "Alleluia" journey, the rest of your lives.

Beginning April 5, every adult in Iowa (aged 16 and up) can register for a COVID vaccine. The following link may be helpful (https://vaccinate.iowa.gov/providers/).

At present, roughly 18% of Iowa's population is fully vaccinated. At DWC, 21% of the 180 members of our community are fully vaccinated.

There is excellent news on the effectiveness of the Pfizer-BioNTech and Moderna vaccines. The CDC reports on a new study of 4000 health care personnel, first responders, and essential workers who were tested weekly for the virus that causes COVID-19. The estimated effectiveness **for prevention of infection was 90% for of those with full immunization.** The study shows that "authorized mRNA COVID-19 vaccines



are effective for preventing SARS-CoV-2 infection, regardless of symptom status, among workingage adults in real-world conditions. This means that the vaccines are effective not only in preventing symptoms of COVID-19, but also preventing the virus from infecting a person who is without symptoms" (CDC). That makes it much, much harder for the virus to spread. COVID-19 vaccination is recommended for all eligible persons.





Student Referrals

As noted last week at the student assembly on Thursday in the chapel, the second best referral source to the vocation office are referrals from current Divine Word College students. About 22% of young men referred by a current DWC student enters formation as an SVD candidate. We have learned that "word of mouth" advertising is better than any ad we can put on the internet or in a magazine. The vocation office appreciates referrals from DWC students of young men who might be interested in further discerning a call to join the SVD.

Thus, there has been a long-standing tradition of offering a stipend to current Divine Word College students who refer young men to the vocation office. The only requirements to be eligible for the \$200 stipend are that the person you refer must enter formation and that you must still be a student at Divine Word College when he first enrolls. Over the last ten years, the vocation office has paid 20 stipends for student referrals. The



last two stipend recipients were Michelet Boncoeur, who is now in the SVD novitiate at Techny, and Marc Declama, SVD, who is now in temporary vows at the Divine Word Theologate in Chicago. Back in 2016, the vocation office gave a stipend to Sr. Ly Nguyen, LHC, for making a referral to the vocation office.

We encourage religious sisters, diocesan priests and all students at Divine Word College to share your experience and invite and encourage young men you know to consider formation with the Divine Word Missionaries. If you know someone interested, talk with him and refer him to the vocation office. If he enters formation and you are still a DWC student, you'll receive a \$200 stipend!

The Word Among Us

Vaccines and PTO

Divine Word College strongly encourages everyone to get one of the COVID vaccines as soon as it is made available. As an incentive, DWC employees are not required to use vacation or PTO if a COVID vaccine appointment occurs during working hours. While faculty are not required to use PTO for COVID vaccine appointments, they are still required to submit a Faculty Class Absence Report (F-CAR) form if missing class time.

Holy Thursday Collection for Migrants at the Border

Migrants are again arriving at the U.S.-Mexico border at increased levels, including thousands of children. Preliminary government data shows Border Patrol detained more than 11,000 unaccompanied migrant children between February 28 and March 20, already eclipsing the number apprehended in the full month of February. As of March 24, there are about 16,000 unaccompanied children in US custody (from CNN website).

Why are people coming to the US?

The pandemic has taken a dramatic toll on Latin America, where Covid-19 cases and deaths have soared and economies once projected to grow have been decimated. The region was also hit with two devastating hurricanes. The decline in economic growth in 2020 is expected to worsen income inequality and poverty in the region.

What can we do?

Catholic Charities of the Rio Grande Valley (CCRGV) in Texas provides humanitarian relief to immigrant children and families. It's Humanitarian Respite Center provides a place for the countless men, women, children, and infant refugees to rest, have a warm meal, a shower, and change into clean clothing as well as receive medicine and other supplies, before continuing onto their journey. Thousands have been helped over the past five years. Sister Norma Pimentel, the Executive Director of CCRGV, writes "The social mission of the Church to help those in need is clearly advanced through services carried out by all who participate with Catholic Charities."
