College. Usually they meet at the College, but for the last three semesters the meetings have been held by ZOOM. On Saturday morning May 1 they met to consider a very full agenda. Their principal decisions are listed in the text box.

A first item on the agenda was to reelect me and Fr. John Szukalski for three-year terms to serve as President and Vice-President. We are grateful for the vote of confidence from the Trustees and will do our best to keep their trust by serving the DWC community as best we can.

Dubuque County is now 41% fully vaccinated! (Remember, children under 16 are not currently eligible for the vaccine, so of all adults 16 and older 54% of the population is fully vaccinated.) People at DWC are helping to boost that vaccination rate. Last week, a large number of students and employees received their second dose of COVID-19 vaccine. Before graduation on May 14, another 35 students and employees will be vaccinated. The SVD community at Epworth is already fully vaccinated!

By the end of the semester, 166 members of the current 174 DWC community members will have received their second vaccine. Several are planning to receive the vaccine over summer, and a few are reluctant to receive the vaccination. Altogether, **95% will be vaccinated by May 14**. Congratulations! And Thank you!

Students, we need your help

Spread the word about the SVD and Divine Word College!

Fr. Tom reminded me yesterday of an old saying: We never vacation from our vocation. One aspect of our vocation by the virtue of our baptism is that we are called to invite others to be Jesus' disciples. Indeed, some may be considering a religious vocation. Here are three things you can do to help spread the word and help the Vocations/Admissions Office:

- Take some literature with you this summer and give to those who are interested or put it on a back table at a church (after getting permission!).
- If given the chance, talk about your vocation to small groups (youth groups) and let them know that you're studying at Divine Word College.
- Personally invite someone to consider a religious vocation with the SVD or consider attending Divine Word College. Give their names to the vocation office. Remember, there is a \$200 stipend for SVD candidate referrals who eventually enter formation.

Faculty and Staff...We need your help too!

Please take note of the Good Neighbor Scholarship. Divine Word College is offering a scholarship to people *of any age* in the greater Epworth area (within daily driving distance) who are interested in earning a two-year AA Degree. Do you know of a young person who graduated from high school and would like to earn an AA Degree? What about someone who is older and always wanted to go to college, but wasn't able? This might be a perfect opportunity for them to consider the Good Neighbor Scholarship that allows for an AA Degree in Intercultural Studies, Theology and Mission or Interdisciplinary Studies. Please contact Len Uhal for more information and to get brochures you can share with others.



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Also, as an employee benefit, faculty and full-time staff and their spouses and children can take classes at Divine Word College free of charge. If you've always wanted to learn more about a topic in theology, like world religions, or take an art course, like drawing, or study Spanish, maybe now is the time. Consider registering for a class at DWC next semester.

Enrollment for August

Several people in the last few weeks have asked me about new students for next semester—What will the enrollment be like in August?

Currently, we have 98 students at Divine Word College. At present, I am aware that 17 students will not return in August, which includes graduates and a few other students. That means there will be about 81 returning students. As of May 4, 2021, the Admissions Committee has accepted 18 new students who plan to come to Divine Word College in August, including three SVD candidates. In addition, the Admissions Office is working with 24 more people who are looking to apply for August, including seven SVD candidates. That's a total 42 *possible* new students. *Realistically*, I suspect 20-25 may actually arrive. Add the two together (returning and new students) and God willing, we should have just over 100 students to start the next academic year. Thank you for your continued prayers for new students.

Have a good summer!

On behalf of the vocation directors and the entire Admissions Office staff, congratulations to all the graduates! We wish everyone a fun and restful summer. While we may be a bit freer this summer than last, be sure to stay safe and healthy as you travel. Be sure to find time to both recreate and re-create during the next three months. Megan Hall Project - 2021

Renovations to Megan Hall are scheduled to begin on May 17, 2021. Substantial completion of the project is scheduled for August of 2021. The goal of this project is to improve and preserve Megan Hall so that it will continue to serve as a residence hall far into the future.

Improvements include the following...

Renew stucco on the older north building. The proposal is to repair the stucco where needed and to apply new wire lathe attached to the underlying stone and cover all with several coats of stucco with color already incorporated.

Siding for the "newer southern two thirds" addition. The current stucco will be removed, the building will be wrapped in Tyvek wrap, then a layer of insulation board attached, and finally the vinyl siding installed.

Installation of tiling and gutters. Downspouts will be connected to drainage tiling that will discharge to the "drainage gulch" on the west side of Megan and to the lower area northeast of Megan. Perimeter "weeping" tile will be installed around the building to gather and discharge water, including from the window wells.

Installation of new backup generator. A natural gas emergency generator will be installed on the northeast side of the building. As with the other buildings on campus, a wintertime power loss could result in frozen plumbing with consequent expense and disruption to repair it. The generator (about the size of an AC condenser) will be located on northeast corner of the building.

Total cost estimate. The project has an estimated cost of \$395,000.

Requesting support from benefactors. Funds for the project come from a bequest from last year of \$114,000. In addition, a generous alum and benefactor contributed \$100,000 for the project. The Development department continues working on several campaigns to seek further donations.

As I prepare my seventh president's report to the Board of Trustees, I cannot help but look back over the past four years and give thanks for so many blessings. Following are a series of "milestones," most of which were documented in previous meetings of the Board of Trustees.

1. Academic Affairs - Fr. John Szukalski SVD, the Vice President for Academic Affairs, has been an enormous source of energy, curiosity, creativity and dedication. Even more, he has been a great brother to me. Three achievements stand out for me on the academic side of things.

- Assessment. The Higher Learning Commission made their usual mid-term visit to Divine Word College in November 2019. It was well prepared, and the results were positive. As expected, we are asked to concentrate on improving our ability to assess the effectiveness of our courses in promoting student learning. That is now the major undertaking of the College as can be seen in the new Strategic Plan. I believe we are beginning to develop a culture of assessment, where previously there was little interest in the matter.
- Shared Governance. When I started in 2017, the new faculty senate was barely functioning. Concerns were raised by the HLC regarding the state of shared governance at Divine Word College. Fr. John has been very effective at encouraging greater participation by the faculty in questions that are of concern to them. He is especially clear about the process of decision-making, so that faculty members have a clear view of the participation of Department Chairs, the Board of Administration and the Board of Trustees. A further revision of the by-laws of the Faculty Senate has recently been proposed to help facilitate the functioning of the senate.
- **Core Competencies.** Better assessment begins with knowing what we want to measure. In 2019, we began to articulate five core competencies to describe the skills that students at DWC should be able to develop. They are: Critical Thinking Acuity, Communication Effectiveness, Intercultural Competence, Social and Global Responsibility, and Missionary Discipleship. I am especially happy that grow directly out of the Mission Statement of the College, and that they spell out skills that every missionary should be keen to develop. If Divine Word College is to be the Alma Mater (Mother of a Soul) for anyone, these competencies are the DNA of that motherhood. These competencies inspire me because I know by experience that SVD missionaries must rely on them in their real life missionary service.

2. Admissions and Vocations – Mr. Len Uhal, the Vice President for Admissions, leads a team of remarkable vocations ministers and a support staff to help new students find their way to Divine Word College.

• Impressive young men and women. Fundamentally, the College is built on the enthusiasm, the eagerness to serve, and the energy of the student body. They come from amazingly diverse backgrounds, often representing twenty nations and more. They learn a lot from the faculty and staff, and even more from the world-embracing friendships they form while here. They become colleagues to one another.

- 125, 50 and 28. At one point, just before the COVID-19 outbreak, the admissions department achieved its strategic goal of 125 students enrolled, 50 of whom were SVD candidates. Now, the rebuilding starts over again. There is one more critical number to keep in focus 28 students from DWC have applied for the SVD novitiate (in Techny and in Mindoro) in the past four years.
- Loans. In the past two years, the admissions department has made a strong, sustained effort to reduce the backlog of non-performing loans to former students. Many of these alumni have begun regular payments, or have become regular donors to the college after the forgiveness of "ancient" loans.

3. Formation and Student Life – Fr. Long Phi Nguyen SVD, the Vice President for Formation, manages a large and diverse team of support personnel who are dedicated to help the students grow personally and spiritually as they embrace a life of missionary service.

- **Transition of personnel.** Many new members have joined the team, as others who served for many years moved on to other ministries. The team includes formation directors, counselors, spiritual directors, the chaplain, the counselor, and coordinators for liturgy, ministries, sports, and health services! Many people wear more than one hat. The transition from Fr. Bang Tran SVD to Fr. Long Phi in the role of VP has been amazingly smooth.
- Core Competencies and Facets of the Religious Formation Program (RFP). The formation team is making good progress in integrating the core competencies of the College with the five facets of formation, i.e., Human, Spiritual, Intellectual, Intercultural Community, and Missionary Ministry. The skills outlined in the core competencies are not only academic concerns; they mature more completely in the other facets of life outlined in the Formation Program.
- **Promoting an Intercultural Outlook.** The student body has been highly "intercultural" over these past four years. However, the formation team was less so, and it was the team itself that continually raised this concern. The team is now more intercultural, and continues to move in that direction, including members whose personal heritage is Vietnamese, Indonesian, Filipino, Ghanaian, Indian, Togolese, US, and mixtures of the above. They strongly encourage the students to take risks and reach out to people beyond their own cultural group.

4. Operations and Planning – Mr. Steve Winger, the Vice President for Operations, has proven to be an effective planner and manager of the physical plant and the human resources of Divine Word College. Over the first four years of his work at DWC, his skills as a city manager have translated very well to our needs.

- Useful Strategic Planning. The 2018-2021 Strategic Plan was the fruit of widespread consultation with different College constituencies, and resulted in a series of action steps that did move the College forward. The final "scorecard" is attached. One of the visitors from the Higher Learning Commission commented that our regular review of the Strategic Plan was a real strength of the college. So many other places, he said, put their "three volume" plans on the shelf and dusted them off only when it was time for a new plan.
- **Capital Improvements.** Significant capital improvements have been carried out, including a new roof for the main building, LED lighting throughout the campus, a new sign at the entrance to the college, and improvements of the asphalt drive and parking areas. Smaller projects included the rebuilding of steps in the courtyard, remodeling of some classrooms and seminar rooms, the organization of college archives, installation of some A/C split units, and remodeling of some showers and

bathrooms in the main building. Two major projects are planned for the summer of 2021improvements to the exterior of Megan Hall and the installation of emergency backup generators.

• **Human Resources.** Mr. Winger has kept the college administration up to date (and out of conflict) on a number of issues with the help of Cottingham and Butler, our HR consultants. Recent investigations have led us to join a health insurance coalition put together by the Freidman Insurance Group that allows for excellent coverage at a significant reduction in cost.

5. External Affairs – Three years ago I established the external affairs council to gather together three departments that are focused on our outreach to the public. The Development Offices, the Public Relations Department, and the Alumni Association work very closely with one another in numerous projects to encourage support for the college and to animate friends and benefactors to live out their own missionary calling. The Vocations Office is also a regular participant in the External Affairs Council.

- Benefactors. The efforts of the development department, both in general outreach and Vietnamese outreach, have been spectacular over the past several years. The average income over the past three years is close to \$2.8 million, helped out considerably by the exceptional number of large bequests last year. This year will likely also pass \$2 million since donations at the end of the third quarter totaled \$1.77m. Our benefactors have been generous, even in this COVID year, and not only because of unusual bequests. At the end of the third quarter of this year, bequests amounted to only 3.9% of this fiscal year's development income. What is most amazing is that our donor retention rate is 72%, very far above national averages.
- **College News in the Province Bulletins.** The Public Relations Office, the Alumni Office and the Vocations Department have been very good at supplying a steady stream of stories and photos that chronicle our life at DWC. I am very grateful to see those stories picked up in the Province Bulletin so that SVD's around the country can get a taste of what is happening here.
- **Collaboration with Sisters in DBQ.** Three Congregations of Women Religious in Dubuque have long been collaborators with DWC. The leadership teams of the BVMs, Presentations, and Franciscans were together at the same table during the fundraiser with Cardinal Dolan in 2017. Since then, the relationship with the College has grown ever stronger. The three congregations now host sixteen young women religious who attend DWC at their convents in Dubuque. Sr. Kate of the BVMs has joined the Board of Trustees. SVDs are always blessed with the presence of our Holy Spirit Mission and Adoration Sisters nearby. We are also blessed with other women religious who help the Arnoldus family to prepare another generation of women leaders for missionary service.

6. Administrative Matters – Office work is my "bread and butter" at DWC. Though I have fantasized about teaching a course at the College, it just does not seem a realistic possibility given the need for attention to so many other pressing matters. Oftentimes I smile thinking of a witticism of my grandfather: "It's hard to think about draining the swamp when you are up to your 'waist?' in alligators."

- **Policy Handbook.** Aided by the persistent dedication of Ms. Donna Puccio, we have been revising and updating the DWC Policy Handbook. I hope the project can be completed this summer. The current version is already a considerable improvement.
- **Budgeting and Financial Reporting.** The DWC Business Office has made steady improvements in both budgeting and financial reporting. With the help of the DWC Financial Affairs Committee, a revised chart of accounts was developed that allows for better decision-making at the College. The oversight of the Board of Trustees Finance Committee, the Budget and the Finance Committees of

the Province, and our Auditors have helped to improve the financial position of the College. Since FY2017, province subsidies have been relatively stable to declining at under \$3m/year; a large extraordinary capital investment in the roof of the College; and the endowment and investments have grown by roughly \$8 million. The recent addition of an outside controller to help with financial statements and a review of internal controls is a big plus.

• **COVID-19 Response.** For the past fifteen months, COVID response has been the dominant daily concern. Meetings of the DWC emergency committees early on, and later meetings of the Board of Administration (with the occasional attendance of the Rector and the Health Services Coordinator) helped to chart a fairly safe course through the crisis. In the first six weeks of Jan-Feb 2021, there were a total of 33 confirmed positives in the DWC community. A rapid, temporary shift to distance learning and off-site working allowed for a containment of the outbreak by the third week of February. Vaccines have now become widely available; more than 95% will be vaccinated before the end of the current academic year.

Revise and implement the Religious Formation Curriculum.

[Rationale: As a Catholic institution dedicated to the formation of men and women for the missionary service in the Church and in the world, Divine Word College Seminary adheres to the Program of Priestly Formation as developed by the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops while honoring and preserving the missionary charism of the Society of the Divine Word.

The Religious Formation Program at Divine Word College therefore reflects both the ecclesiastical as well as the missionary characteristics required of a seminary college for missionary service. The updated Religious Formation Program of 2015 outlines the important foundations for implementing a program of formation that meets the needs of the Church, the SVDs, and the individual candidates.

The 2021-2024 Strategic Plan under review seeks to provide clear descriptions and continuity across all formational areas of candidates in line with the goal of meeting their individual formation needs. The goals and objectives of this Strategic Plan are articulated in the context of the DWC core competences (Critical Thinking Acuity, Communication Effectiveness, Intercultural Competence, Social & Global Responsibility, and Missionary Discipleship) and the five facets of the Religious Formation Program (Human, Spiritual, Intellectual, Intercultural Community, and Missionary Ministry). In achieving the above-mentioned goal, the 2021-2024 Strategic Plan aims at the following:]

Objective 7: Develop a descriptive structure for the DWC Religious Formation Curriculum to ensure the clarity of purpose, the articulation of candidate learning outcomes, as well as the relevance of areas of competence and required skills for candidates being prepared for SVD missionary service in the Church and in the world.

[Rationale: The five facets of the religious formation program at DWC must be truly grounded in the Catholic identity and the SVD missionary charism.]

Action Step 7.1: Form five subcommittees of three members to work on each formation facet. Suggested changes to the religious formation curriculum are subject to further reviews, evaluations, and ultimate approval by the Formation and Student Life Committee.

GOAL E: EXTERNAL AFFAIRS (PRESIDENT, DEVELOPMENT, PR, ALUMNI)

Reaching out, we encourage our friends to support and participate in missionary service.

[Rationale: As Divine Word College prepares students for missionary outreach, it also embodies a missionary presence in our neighborhood and around the world.]

Objective 12: Strengthen the *Divine Word Alumni Association.*

[Rationale: Between 1964 and 2020, more than 1670 students have studied at DWC in the ESL and undergraduate programs; 718 have earned undergraduate degrees. Many thousands more Divine Word alumni have studied at other SVD schools since the first SVD formation program (a postulancy for brothers) was opened at Techny on September 8, 1901. We have contact with only a fraction of alumni. The three SVD provinces of North America ask that DWC serve as the organizational center of a reorganized alumni association.]

Responsible: Alumni Director Target completion: Fall 2022 Budget: negligible Action Step 12.4: Launch the new website for the Divine Word Alumni Association including updated directory and missionary stories of lay and religious alumni.

Responsible: Alumni Director, Public Relations Director **Target completion:** Fall 2021 **Budget:** \$5250

Action Step 12.5: Provide opportunities for alumni to gather virtually.

Responsible: Alumni Director **Target completion:** Fall 2021 **Budget:** negligible

Objective 13: Further organize, strengthen and grow our local DWC Friends.

[Rationale: Many "local" people have shown their friendship over the years. It is time to cultivate those friendships by more systematically addressing them and recognizing their collaboration. DWC Friends would include trustees, former trustees, people who have been awarded the Donaghey and Matthew 25 awards, FAN Club participants, volunteers, and local benefactors.]

Action Step 13.1: Name a coordinator for inviting and recognizing DWC Friends.

Responsible: College President **Target completion**: Fall 2022 **Budget**: \$10,000 in pt salary

Action Step 13.2: Establish and maintain a contact list of DWC Friends for use when promoting activities at the college.

Responsible: Public Relations Director and DWC Friends Coordinator **Target completion:** Fall 2021 **Budget:** negligible Action Step 13.3: Enlist the help of SVD confreres from Epworth to invite people to participate in the mission of DWC (e.g., provide a script for presiders to read at the conclusion of Mass that includes brief information on ways for people to be involved and who to call for more information.)

Responsible: DWC Friends Coordinator, Public Relations Director **Target completion:** Spring 2023 **Budget:** negligible

Action Step 13.4: Prepare a printed booklet of frequently asked questions about DWC to help faculty and staff to invite others to be DWC Friends (Answers are brief and easy to understand. Booklets updated and distributed to all members of the DWC Community on an annual basis.)

Responsible: Public Relations Director and DWC Friends Coordinator, **Target completion**: Spring 2022 **Budget**: \$500

Objective 14: Energize our outreach with new and existing *benefactors***.**

[Rationale: Our benefactors have been very generous. In the last several years, they have provided nearly one third of the income to DWC through direct contributions and through return on investments of their gifts.]

Action Step 14.1: Develop and implement a plan for personal visits to long time benefactors and major donors to strengthen our relationships with them. (Seek collaboration with Executive Dir. of the Chicago Province Development Committee.)

Responsible: Development Director, Associate Development Director **Target completion:** Spring 2022 **Budget:** Approx. \$12,000 already regularly budgeted

Action Step 14.2: Develop a website for Vietnamese language donors to be linked to the DWC website.

Responsible: Development Director Target completion: Fall 2022 Budget: \$5000 Action Step 14.3: Seek increased collaboration from SVD members and alumni throughout the North American provinces in order to promote SVD missionary outreach and fundraising efforts by attending regional alumni gatherings.

Responsible: Development Director Target completion: Spring 2023 Budget: Approx. \$2000 already regularly budgeted

Objective 15: Help DWC students to acquire and develop skills for local outreach.

[Rationale: In the future, our students will often be called upon to reach out for local support for their missionary projects. We want to help them develop their skills at meeting the public and cultivating the relationship. Learning to say "hello" and "thank you."]

Action Step 15.1: Prepare DWC students (and local SVDs) to take part in outreach events (All Souls Day, Matthew 25, Meet and Greet, Epworth Country Christmas...).

Responsible: Public Relations Director Target completion: Fall 2021 Budget: negligible

Action Step 15.2: Encourage students to send personal notes or cards to DWC Friends and benefactors for birthdays (if known), holidays, or just to thank them for supporting DWC.

Responsible: Public Relations Director Target completion: Spring 2022 Budget: \$1500
