We can all promote religious vocations!

National Vocation Awareness Week kicked off on Sunday and runs through this Saturday, November 13. Each year during this week-long celebration of the Catholic Church in the United States, we're all asked to promote vocations to the sisterhood, brotherhood, priesthood and the diaconate through prayer and education. This is the day-to-day focus of those of us who work in the SVD Vocation Office but it's really a responsibility we all share.

In the last five years, the SVD Tri-Province Vocation Office at Divine Word College received an average of 243 referrals each year. Last year during COVID, we received only 155 referrals, that's down from a recent high of 343 in 2017. Looking back ten years ago, we averaged 428 referrals a year. What a difference a decade makes.

As employees and students at a Catholic seminary college, we're all very aware of religious vocations, but you may ask yourself, "what can I do to increase the number of people in religious life? How can I make a difference?" The answer is, there's A LOT you can do!

Ways to promote religious life

- Pray for an increase of religious/priestly vocations.
- Tell a young person why you think he might make a good religious, priest, or deacon.
- Invite young people at your parish to join the choir, become a lector, Eucharistic Minister, catechist, be on the parish council or join other parish groups/organizations.
- Go with young people on a mission trip.

- Encourage young people to pray and attend prayer opportunities, like Eucharistic Adoration or prayer groups.
- Share your faith experiences with young people so they can begin to identify the importance of the faith experiences they have.
- Refer a young person to a vocation director.

Over the years, we've heard from many students that they decided to pursue their vocation because someone said, "I think you would be a good priest (sister, brother, deacon)." That one sentence affirmation made them believe the dream could become a reality.





Currently, 58.7% of all Dubuque County residents are fully vaccinated (69.1% of all Dubuque County residents age 12+ are fully vaccinated). Vaccination will be even more important in the coming months as colder weather pushes us indoors.



Positive tests for COVID-19 are disproportionately present among people of school age.



The CDC continues to rate Dubuque County at the **HIGH** level of community transmission of COVID-19, based on the number of new cases of COVID-19 over the past seven days (434), and on the increasing percentage of tests which show a positive result over the past week (18.06% through Oct 30). Vaccine Boosters – According to the CDC website, "people ages 18–64 years at increased risk for COVID-19 exposure and transmission because of occupational or *institutional* setting **may** get a booster shot based on their individual risks and benefits. Adults who work or reside in certain settings (e.g., health care, *schools*, correctional facilities, homeless shelters) may be at increased risk of being exposed to COVID-19, which could be spreading where they work or reside." Note – schools like DWC are explicitly included in the list of institutional settings where booster shots are permitted. See httml#anchor_1635289011508

Vaccinations for Children Approved – The Dubuque County Health Department notes on their webpage that, "The CDC's Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP) voted unanimously on Nov. 2 to recommend the use of Pfizer-BioNTech's COVID-19 vaccine for children ages 5–11." This follows the decision by the US Food and Drug Administration (FDA) to authorize emergency use of the vaccine to include children. The FDA's analysis concluded that the immunizations for children were both **effective and safe**. See https://www.dubuquecountyiowa.gov/567/COVID-19-Vaccinations

Annual ESL Student Opinion Survey

The Intensive English Language Institute [IELI] recently conducted the annual ESL Student Opinion Survey, with 22 out of 24 current ESL students (92%) responding. The survey demonstrates overall strong student satisfaction with various aspects of the English as a Second Language program:

- 90% of ESL students like the 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. schedule
- 86% of ESL students like the 20-23 hours of instruction per week (2 students wanted more class hours, 1 student wanted less class hours)
- 82% of ESL students like the distribution of class hours: 10 hours Grammar/Writing; 10 hours Communication; 3 hours Reading
- 64% of ESL students reported enough time to finish homework outside of classes
- ESL students identified two tools most effective for assisting their learning: Pronunciation Power (73%) and Online English practice (73%)
- 82% of ESL students think the promotion policy is clear and okay (students' understanding of the ESL promotion policy has improved over previous years due to clear academic advising, publication of ESL student achievement reports, and ESL-specific orientation for new students).

Congratulations to Dr. Seo Hyun Park—IELI Director—and all ESL instructors for their continued hard work and dedication in providing students with an excellent ESL program of which Divine Word College can be proud! The complete numerical survey results are appended to this issue of the LOG.



What is the difference between qualitative and quantitative data?

Both types of data present very insightful and valuable methods of research. What type of research you engage in, what question or questions you ask, or what field you are in determines and influences the methodology and use of qualitative vs. quantitative data. The most common types of quantitative research design are experimental, quasi-experimental, descriptive, and correlational.

Unfortunately, qualitative data and research has gotten a bad reputation in the past years as many critics believe it to be less valid than quantitative research due to the potentially subjective nature of the data it produces. However, qualitative data is just as valuable as quantitative; it simply yields different types of insights as it seeks to answer different kinds of questions.

Both types of research can also be used together in order to create even more robust outcomes/data! This is referred to as mixed-methods design.

Wildenslo Osias








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What is the best ESL schedule for you? Choose one.









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
How many hours of English classes per week are best for you?






Do you like the current number of hours you spend in different classes?


Do you have enough time to finish homework outside of classes?


