An Easter Body

Your Easter body is bigger than you think! I am not referring to extra calories as a result from a visit from the Easter Bunny. Nor am I thinking about end of the year parties at DWC. I am thinking about the way Jesus' resurrected body gives us a radically different perspective to think of our own bodies.

Three things about Jesus' appearances caught my attention this Easter season.

First, Jesus eats something. In Luke's Gospel, when Jesus appears to the disciples on the evening of his resurrection, he says "Peace be with you," but they are still afraid. He encourages them,

"Look at my hands and feet...Touch me and see." They almost went out of their minds with joy. Jesus then asks whether they have something to eat. They give him a piece of baked fish that he eats in front of them. With that gesture, Jesus restores fellowship with his friends. So much has happened since he last ate with his disciples, most of it horrendous. When Jesus eats with them again, he is as intimate with them as he was at their last supper. Jesus wants to be touched by them on Easter evening.

At a First Communion celebration recently, told the children that through Holy Communion, Jesus wants to be best friends. He wants to be even closer than a brother or sister.

Jesus wants to get into our stuff, and he doesn't mind if we get into his stuff. Jesus body is not out of bounds for us, and our bodies are part of his. We are in communion with Jesus.



Second, Jesus gives his disciples something to eat. John's Gospel recalls the time, after the resurrection, that Jesus appeared to Peter, John and the others who had been out fishing. They caught so many fish it was a miracle!

Jesus prepared a breakfast for them of bread and some of the fish that they had caught. The event has many interpretations, but one clear meaning is that Jesus wants his disciples to stay together and support one another. The huge number of fish shows that the future for the disciples will be filled abundantly. And, Jesus spoke privately with Peter helping him to see that his love for Jesus meant he should take care of the brethren.

Communion with Jesus means a communion with his other followers too. Like Peter, we are called to feed Jesus' sheep. There is plenty of food for everyone, and there are abundant responsibilities too. Jesus continues to gather many followers around his table. Our communion is with all of them.

Third, the disciples don't recognize Jesus immediately. The disciples have trouble in recognizing Jesus after his resurrection. In the garden, on the road to Emmaus and at breakfast on the seashore, the disciples are slow to recognize that the person they are dealing with is Jesus. I am reminded of some of the funeral eulogies I have heard. The person who has died might not quite recognize himself or herself in the kind words of family and friends. Death changes our bodies and the way we look upon those who survive us. We don't mean to hide the faults of those who have died, but death readjusts our vision to see more clearly the good and generous things they have done.

Communion with Jesus means a communion with all the saints, for he is one body with all of them. In the slowness of the disciples to recognize that "it is the Lord," we have a hint of how much our bodies will also be changed as we pass through death.

Our Easter bodies are so much bigger than we realize. Living in love with Jesus, with brothers and sisters whom we meet next-door and all around the world, and with Jesus' friends from long ago and long into the future, gives us an idea of the coming transformation awaiting all of us. When I feel hemmed in with too much work or too little enthusiasm, I remind myself that I am already alive forever; and then I ask myself, so what should I do today? Or as we say in the Creed, "I believe in the communion of saints..., the resurrection of the body, and life everlasting."

I remember communion, and ask Jesus to feel free to get into my stuff.

COVID-19 Guidance



The number of new cases of COVID-19 detected in Dubuque County has continued to rise. At present, there are approximately nine cases per day in an area of approximately 100,000 inhabitants.

The number of cases remains very low compared to the surge experienced in late January and early February when there were more than 1,000 cases per week (or 147 cases each day)!

In late April, two cases were detected in off-campus employees. Both cases resolved quickly, and no cases were detected in the student body.

New Undergraduate Department Chairs

After due consultation with and upon the recommendation of the Vice President for Academic Affairs, I am pleased to announce that President Thomas Ascheman SVD has officially appointed:

- Dr. Yasmin Rioux as the new Department Chair for Interdisciplinary Studies [DIS]
- Dr. Jason Reed as the new Department Chair for Theology & Philosophy [DTP].

Both appointments are effective 1 August 2022. According to the DWC Policy Handbook:

The Department Chair plays a critical role in academic governance. The Chair is a collaborative leader who contributes to, and advances, shared academic governance of the College by representing the administration to the faculty and the faculty to the administration. The Chair exercises leadership in advancing the Mission and Strategic Planning Goals of the College by cultivating quality faculty, continuously improving degree programs, and facilitating effective teaching and advisement of students. Dr. Yasmin Rioux had been an Assistant Professor of Communication at Divine Word College from 2017-2020. After a one-year hiatus in Germany, she returned to DWC in 2021 as Director for Institutional Effectiveness charged with facilitating the overhaul of the assessment plan in accord with the 2021-2024 Strategic Plan Goal A: "Create and implement a coherent assessment protocol to measure student learning and program effectiveness." Dr. Rioux holds a Ph.D. in English – Composition & TESOL from the Indiana University of Pennsylvania in addition to an M.A. in Communication from the University of Dubuque. In her new role as DIS Chair, Dr. Rioux will concurrently continue as Director for Institutional Effectiveness.



Dr. Jason Reed has been an Assistant Professor of Philosophy at Divine Word College since 2019. He has been a member of the HLC Assessment Academy Team and the Academic Assessment Committee, assisting with the overhaul of DWC's assessment plan. Dr. Reed earned his Ph.D. in Philosophy from St. Louis University after having completed his M.A. in Philosophy at that same institution. He also has an M.A. in Apologetics from Southern Evangelical Seminary in Charlotte, NC. Prior to arriving at DWC, he taught undergraduate philosophy courses at Loras College in Dubuque, Mount Mary University in Cedar Rapids, and Clarke University in Dubuque. He also



taught courses in philosophy and comparative religions at Xavier High School in Cedar Rapids.

Special thanks to **Dr. Cathleen Cleary** who has served as DIS Chair and **Dr. Ron Condon** who served as DTP Chair during the 2019-2022 triennium. Both Dr. Cleary and Dr. Condon helped implement significant improvements to academic programs in response to the annual self-studies and external reviews that took place during their terms. They will remain the Chairs through the end of the current academic year.

Tips for Success on Your Final Exam

(Study Smarter, Not Harder by Kevin Paul, MA; Chapter 13)

Preparations

- 1. Get enough sleep; don't eat heavy meals, drink any alcohols or too much coffee.
- 2. Don't try to learn something new.
- 3. Use positive self-talk and visualization to yourself.
- 4. Please avoid talking to a nervous student nor making others nervous.
- 5. Have all your stationaries ready for the exam.
- 6. Calm your anxiety by using some techniques.
- 7. Arrive early; choose a comfortable seat.
- 8. Read all directions carefully.

Multiple-choice

- 1. Read every question carefully; do not rush.
- 2. Do the easy questions. Go back to the difficult ones later.
- 3. Make sure that you understand the question and each of possible answer.
- 4. Immediately leave out the wrong answer or foolish alternative.
- 5. Choose the answer that is most correct.
- 6. Work actively. You can underline key words, tenses, plurals, etc.
- 7. Check for inconsistency: singular vs plurals, the tenses, and the grammars. For example: if the question is singular, but the alternative answer is plural, it can likely be a wrong answer.
- 8. Try to visualize yourself studying the chapter. You might 'see' the answer at this moment.

Change your answer? You have to trust your instinct. Usually the first choice is the correct one. Only change the answer when you are convinced that your initial choice is wrong.

Some hints for guessing. These are only hints about what is likely; it is not always true.

- 1. If one answer is substantially longer, it could be the right answer.
- 2. If there are two exact opposites, the answer could be one of them.
- 3. A choice of "all of the above" is more likely to be the right answer versus "none of the above".

True/False

- 1. Do the easy questions.
- 2. Be careful with guessing. There are cues that are peculiar to true/false exams.

a.Statements that are ardent and use definitive words, such as always, never, all, must, every time, and none, are usually false.

b.Statements such as usually, most often, likely, probably, could, might, should and rarely are usually true.

c.Since it is usually easier to write true statements than to write the false ones, longer statements are more likely to be true than false.

Essay

- 1. Read through all the essay questions; take time to plan and outline your answers.
- 2. When your write, get to the point immediately.
- 3. Make sure you address the question. Read it carefully and pay attention to the action words such as compare, contrast, discuss, describe, define, differences, etc.
- 4. Pay attention to special instructions such as give examples, certain philosophers or theories, etc.
- 5. Do not leave any questions blank. If you run out of time, list your outline so the professor knows what you intend to write.
