St. Paul's Divine Word College

There is a six foot icon of a well-known saint at DWC. Do you know where it is? You have probably walked by it at least one-thousand times since the beginning of the school year!

There is a large statue of the same saint in the main chapel. Do you know where that is? Why do you think it is there?

On Wednesday (Jan 25) we celebrate the feast of **Saint Paul, the patron saint of Divine Word College**. In 1931, the SVDs purchased the 25 acre DWC campus for a total of \$16,000! One portion of the property belonged to my great-grandparents, but the bigger part was formerly a Methodist



seminary, originally established in 1857. We SVDs opened a mission seminary here in 1931 and named it St. Paul Mission House. Just think, there have been Christian schools of higher education operating on this land for 166 years!

Recently I received a copy of a 1906 student handbook for the



Methodist "seminary." While some students were studying for ministry, most of them were studying at a level we would likely call junior college. The student body included Methodists, Lutherans, Catholics and others.

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The "ecumenical" history of this school makes it quite fitting that we celebrate St. Paul's feast every year as our college patron. And, his feast day is the concluding day of the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity.

As we celebrate St. Paul this year, I will especially have three prayers on my mind.

First, I am grateful that St. Paul's conversion allowed him to be a champion for Christ Jesus, opening his arms to Jews and Gentiles alike. I pray that DWC, and my life, will continue to be animated by openness to all peoples, cultures and nations. And I pray that we can be open to other Christians, welcoming them as brothers and sisters.

Second, a line from Paul's letter to the Romans has become a personal motto, expressing my sense of call and purpose: "God's love has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit that has been given to us" (Rm 5:5). When I turn my heart to prayer, I feel St. Paul's friendship and help. May he continue to be a mentor for us in prayer and a helper in sharing our faith with others.

Third, a Trinitarian prayer from Paul's letter to the Ephesians (3:14-21) sends my heart soaring:

- I bow my knees before **the Father**, from whom every family in heaven and on earth takes its name.
- I pray that, according to the riches of his glory he may grant that you may be strengthened in your inner being with power through his **Spirit**,
- and that Christ may dwell in your hearts through faith, as you are being rooted and grounded in love.
- I pray that you may have the power to comprehend, with all the saints, what is the breadth and length and height and depth, and to know the love of Christ that surpasses knowledge, so that you may be filled with all the fullness of God.
- Now to him who by the power at work within us is able to accomplish abundantly far more than all we can ask or imagine, to him be glory in the church and in Christ Jesus to all generations, for ever and ever, Amen.

What more is there to write after such Spirit-filled eloquence? Good St. Paul, pray for us.





Faculty Professional Development: Annual Data Collection For Calendar Year 2022

Divine Word College encourages and facilitates ongoing professional development for instructional faculty. Indeed, ongoing professional development is necessary for faculty to maintain "a high level of subject matter knowledge and ensures that course content is current, accurate, representative, and appropriate to the position of the course within the student's program of studies." (DWC Policy Handbook 7.05.01) This institutional commitment is compliant with professional accreditation standards of the Higher Learning Commission (HLC) and the Commission on English Language Program Accreditation (CEA):

- "The institution has processes and resources for assuring that instructors are current in their disciplines and adept in their teaching roles; it supports their professional development." (HLC Criterion 3.C.4)
- "Faculty have experience relevant to teaching students at the postsecondary level in their areas of assignment and demonstrate an ongoing commitment to professional development." (CEA Faculty Standard 2)

Through the VP for Academic Affairs Office, the College provides many opportunities and generous funding for faculty ongoing professional development at the College (Faculty Institute, Faculty In-Services, web-based training) and for external professional conferences, workshops, and webinars.

In order to accurately document that all faculty are actively engaged in ongoing professional development activities, the VP for Academic Affairs Office compiles and publishes an Annual Report on Faculty Professional Development for submission to the Board of Administration and the Board of Trustees. All faculty, excluding adjuncts, are kindly requested to briefly list their professional development activities during calendar year 2022 (January 1 – December 31) using categories below. Feast of the Conversion of St. Paul

On Wednesday, January 25, is the feast of the conversion of St. Paul, Apostle. It is also the end of the week of prayer for Christian unity. The meditation for this day is taken from Psalm 82:1-4

In Psalm 82, God calls for a justice that upholds the basic human rights to which all people are entitled: freedom, safety, dignity, health, equality and love. The Psalm also calls for the overturning of systems of disparity and oppression, and fixing anything that is unfair, corrupt, or exploitative. This is the justice that we, as Christians, are called to promote. In Christian community we join our wills and actions to God's, as he works his salvation for creation.

In Jesus and the Disinherited, The Rev. Dr. Howard Thurman, who was spiritual adviser to The Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. states that: "We must proclaim the truth that all life is one and that we are all of us tied together. Therefore, it is mandatory that we work for a society in which the

least person can find refuge and refreshment. You must lay your lives on the altar of social change so that wherever you are, there the Kingdom of God is at hand."

Jesus tells the parable of the widow and the unjust judge in order to teach the people "about their need to pray always and not to lose heart" (Luke 18: 1). Jesus has won a decisive victory over injustice, sin and division, and as Christians our task is to receive this victory firstly in our own hearts through prayer and secondly in our lives through action. Self-Esteem

Self-esteem refers to the way we see and think about ourselves. It is not about self-love but the evaluation we place on our selfconcept. Some signs of people with high self-esteem are that they respect themselves and consider themselves worthy. People with low self-esteem usually experience self-dissatisfaction and selfrejection. They do not feel good about themselves.

What significant people/events/statements have affected your self-esteem? Can you remember any words or statements your parents said that formed or affected your self-esteem?

We are not born knowing who and what we are. We acquire our image of ourselves over time by realizing our natural abilities and by constantly receiving messages about ourselves from the people closest to us and from our environment. Our upbringing, culture and life experiences influence our self-esteem. Living in a new culture can increase the negative effects on our self-esteem.

There are a few things you can do to increase your self-esteem:

- 1. Cultivate self-compassion. You need to treat yourself with kindness. When you feel down, inadequate, or are struggling, try not to be self-critical. Be gentle to yourself. Failure is not the end of the world.
- 2. Be around people who are very supportive and encouraging. Positive influences will help you to grow positively.
- 3. On the other hand, avoid people and places that make you feel bad about yourself.
- 4. Pay special attention to your personal hygiene, dress in clothes that make you feel good about yourself, and eat good food as part of a healthy, balanced diet.
- 5. Do more of the things you enjoy and remember to do something nice for others.
- 6. Make three lists: one of your strengths, one of your achievements, and one of the things you admire about yourself.
- 7. Dispute your inner negative thoughts and think positively about yourself.
- 8. Set yourself a challenge that you can realistically achieve, and then go for it.
- 9. Practice GRATITUDE give thanks for the gift of life that God has given you.
