HLC Assessment Academy – Project Update 6.0

Divine Word College has been participating in the Higher Learning Commission (HLC) Assessment Academy, a four-year mentor-facilitated structured program aimed at advancing and accelerating an institution's efforts to improve assessment practices. Participation in the Academy has guided our collaborative efforts as a college in crafting a more robust assessment regimen over the last three years. We are in the final year of our 2020-2024 Academy cohort! Thanks for all the great ongoing collaborative work towards achieving Objective #1 of the Strategic Plan and our Academic Goal to "create and implement a coherent assessment protocol to measure student learning and program effectiveness."

Attached to this edition of the LOG, you will find Project Update 6.0 which highlights progress made and tasks still to be completed. Of special note is the deliberate expansion of project scope to incorporate the co-curricular Religious Formation Programs with regard to the Core Competency of Missionary Discipleship (see response #3).

Faculty Professional Development

Dr. Seo Hyun Park—Associate Professor of ESL—has been pre-approved for professional development funding to attend and present at the XIV Coloquio Internacional sobre Investigacion en Lenguas Extranjeras at the National University of Colombia in Bogota held virtually from September 19-21, 2023. Sleep Well, Wake Up Refreshed (adapted from <u>www.TherepistAid.com</u>)

This week is the fourth week of Fall Semester 2023. Time goes very fast. Some classes have had quizzes, papers, and homework. Some students have developed stress and anxiety symptoms, fearing they will not produce good results. Some students have started to stay up late at night, studying or writing papers. Yes, we often forget that having a good night's sleep will help us produce better work quality. Waking up refreshed will allow us to go through the nitty gritty things during the day. Here are some tips to sleep well and wake up refreshed in the morning.

Start with sleep.

- Make sleep a priority.
- Even when life gets busy, don't sacrifice your sleep. A good night's rest will make your morning much easier.
- Practice sleep hygiene. Exercise regularly, avoid caffeine at night, power down electronics an hour before bedtime, and do a calming activity (reading a book, journaling) before bed.
- Stay on schedule. Keep a consistent sleep schedule. Get up at the same time every day, even on weekends or during vacations.
- Set a bedtime early enough for you to get at least 7-8 hours of sleep.
- Do not study or do your homework on your bed.
- Limit exposure to bright light in the evenings.
- Don't eat a large meal before bedtime. If you are hungry at night, eat a light, healthy snack.
- Exercise regularly and maintain a healthy diet.
- Avoid consuming caffeine in the afternoon or evening.
- No alcohol before bedtime.

Rise and shine.

- Wake up to good music or a pleasant alarm sound. Research has shown that waking up to sounds that make you feel good rather than startled is better.
- **Don't hit snooze.** Set your alarm before bed, then put it out of arm's reach. When you wake up in the morning, stay up! Interrupted sleep isn't as restorative anyway.
- **"Feet on the floor."** As soon as you wake up, get out of bed! Say a short prayer, thanking God for a brand new day. This will help you avoid rolling over for a few extra minutes of sleep.
- Let in natural light. Getting some sunshine in the morning will help you feel more awake. Step outside for a few minutes before starting your morning routine.

Make your mornings pleasant.

- Wake up earlier. It might seem counter intuitive, but waking up earlier may be one of the keys to waking up better. More time will let you move calmly and peacefully through your morning rather than rushing.
- Have something to look forward to. Find something to motivate you to get up and get going in the morning.
- Eat a good breakfast. Consistently eating a healthy breakfast can help you feel more alert in the mornings and may even put you in a better mood.
- For those who do not eat breakfast. Then, find something meaningful to do, such as take a cup of tea and drink it slowly, enjoying the warm, lovely tea. Do not rush to go to work or school.

Divine Word College Presidential Scholarship

Divine Word College first awarded the Presidential Scholarship in 1979 This scholarship is a recognition of and an honor for students who show promise of superior academic achievement.

The Presidential Scholarship includes an annual award of up to \$3,000 renewable each year the recipient continues to meet the established guidelines. The award may result in a further discount of tuition. A maximum of two students may receive this scholarship in a single year.

Criteria for Selection: Students in the Undergraduate Program at Divine Word College are eligible to apply for the Presidential Scholarship provided they meet the following criteria:

- Applicants entering from high school must have a cumulative GPA of 3.50 or above.
- College transfer applicants must have a cumulative college GPA of 3.50 or above.
- Applicants who have completed secondary school or college/university studies abroad must have an acceptable equivalent cumulative GPA.
- Students in the undergraduate program may apply at any time during their studies at Divine Word College provided they have a cumulative grade point average of 3.50 or higher.

Library Tips 101

- 1. The main library website is <u>opac.dwci.edu</u>. This is where you can search the library's catalog and find other library resources. Please bookmark this page! You can also navigate to it through the DWCI.EDU website.
- 2. Your DWC ID card is your library card! Remember to bring it with you to the library so you can check out books or DVDs.
- 3. Checkout your items at the self-checkout machine.
 - a. Click "Check Out"
 - b. Scan the barcode on your ID card
 - c. Put 1-5 items on the machine at a time
 - d. Choose your receipt delivery method (print, email, or none)
 - e. Click Done!
- 4. Books and DVDs may be checked out for 4 weeks at time with 3 renewals (16 weeks total).
- 5. You have a library account! To log in, go to <u>opac.dwci.edu</u>. Your username is your ID # (back of your ID card). If you don't know your password, request a password reset! There is a link under the login screen.
- 6. The library subscribes to the following electronic resources: Credo Reference, JSTOR academic journals and eBooks, EBSCO Academic Search Complete and Philosopher's Index Full Text, ProQuest Linguistics database, Kanopy movie streaming, and Overdrive/Libby eBooks and audioBooks.

After the Midpoint Roundtable and Third Year Mentor Consultation, our Team decided to narrow the scope of our project as documented in update 5. While the first two years of the DWC Assessment Academy project encompassed the entire undergraduate program (2020-2022), the final two years are focused on aligning the Core Curriculum with the Core Competencies (2022-2024). This scope and timeline remain essentially unchanged, except for a deliberate expansion of project scope to incorporate the co-curricular Religious Formation Program. Specifically, assessment protocols will be introduced and implemented for at least one of the Core Competencies as an Institutional Learning Outcome. More on this in response to question #3.

2/ Looking back at the tasks outlined for your Academy project following the Midpoint Roundtable, what progress has been made and what tasks remain? What is the plan to address the remaining tasks in the next six months?

Following the Midpoint Roundtable, our Team crafted an Action Plan. Several of the tasks have been accomplished and/or are ongoing. A Faculty Senate Panel Presentation & Discussion took place in November 2022 and a Faculty In-Service in February 2023 provided input on reviewing and refining rubrics. Concurrently, a Core Curriculum Self-Study was published in Fall 2022, an External Program Reviewer visited DWC in April 2023, and an External Program Reviewer Report was published in July 2023. This last report was focused heavily on improving assessment of Core Competencies. Finally, the annual Faculty Institute in August 2023 saw the on-campus visit by the External Reviewer, an elaboration of the strengths and weaknesses of Core Curriculum assessment, and time for small group work by faculty on reviewing and refining rubrics.

Ongoing primary tasks include ensuring that the Signature Assignments more directly address the intended Core Competency, refining Rubrics with special attention to disaggregating the various dimensions measured to provide more meaningful data, and establishing Targets for both lower-level and upper-level course assessments. Significant effort will be dedicated to Signature Assignments, Rubrics, and Targets over the next six months by the Team in collaboration with the DWC Academic Assessment Committee.

Importantly, the two-year Pilot phase of the new assessment protocol has concluded and results published in a five-page report with data appendices. This report provides helpful observations and recommendations for implementation of the more sustainable five-year academic protocol.

New informal Faculty Colloquia opportunities will be scheduled for the current academic year in further support of these initiatives.

3/ What additional goals has your Academy Team set for the next six months? How does the team plan to achieve these goals?

As referenced above, our Team has decided to deliberately expand project scope to incorporate the co-curricular Religious Formation Program (RFP). The Core Competencies are equivalent to the DWC Institutional Learning Outcomes. Assessment protocols will be introduced and implemented for at least one of the Core Competencies—Missionary Discipleship—over the next six months. To facilitate this collaborative effort between the Academic and co-curricular RFP programs, two additional personnel from the RFP have been appointed to the Team. In early September 2023, the Team discussed the possibility of implementing three instruments with rubrics to assess Missionary Discipleship in the RFP:

A/ Supervisor Ministry Evaluation with Rubric—a direct assessment tool intended to measure application of knowledge, attitudes, and skills in real world ministry engagements.

B/ Formator & Faculty Perception of Students—a direct assessment tool for interrater reliability on perception of students' learning on Institutional Learning Outcomes.

C/ Student Exit Surveys—an indirect assessment tool for exiting DWC students' self-reporting on learnings in the ESL program, the various undergraduate programs, the religious formation programs, and on Institutional Learning Outcomes.

4/ What evidence does the Academy Team have that the Academy project is contributing to a culture of learning at your institution? If needed, how would your team go about collecting additional evidence?

The Academy project is demonstrably contributing to a culture of learning at DWC among both faculty and students. The two-year Assessment Pilot identified strengths, challenges, and even failures in that initial protocol. Rather than ignore those challenges and failures, the Team and faculty sought positive ways to improve assessment practices in the new five-year protocol. Indeed, faculty have utilized a kind of meta-assessment practice to design a framework, collect data, analyze data, and implement improvements to close the loop for their own learning. The Core Curriculum External Reviewer Report put it this way:

While many institutions are working to develop a "culture of assessment," Divine Word College has utilized these assessment practices (as normative behavior) to advance to a "culture of student learning." That is, the primary "driver" of assessment of student learning is not a compliance mindset; rather, it is the desire to continuously improve as they educate tomorrow's missionaries and prepare them for the dynamic environments in which they will serve.

Further evidence for an emerging culture of learning at DWC include:

A/ Efforts at collaboration between the Academic and co-curricular Religious Formation Program on the Core Competencies as Institutional Learning Outcomes have begun. Initial efforts will center on assessing student learning around the Missionary Discipleship core competency.

B/ The Library Director and faculty have begun to augment library resources to support areas of learning that have been formerly neglected, such as the history and culture of the Global South.

C/ A "Campus Read" program was established to help students learn more about American literature and culture.

Presidential Scholarship

Divine Word College first awarded the Presidential Scholarship in 1979. This scholarship is a recognition of and an honor for students who show promise of superior academic achievement.

The Presidential Scholarship includes an annual award of up to \$3,000 renewable each year the recipient continues to meet the established guidelines. The award may result in a further discount of tuition. A maximum of two new applicants may be approved for this scholarship in a single year.

Criteria for Selection:

Students in the Undergraduate Program at Divine Word College are eligible to apply for the Presidential Scholarship provided they meet the following criteria:

- > Applicants entering from high school must have a cumulative GPA of 3.50 or above.
- > College transfer applicants must have a cumulative college GPA of 3.50 or above.
- Applicants who have completed secondary school or college/university studies abroad must have an acceptable equivalent cumulative GPA.
- Students in the undergraduate program may apply at any time during their studies at Divine Word College provided they have a cumulative grade point average of 3.50 or higher.

Preference is given to Presidential Scholarship applicants who show:

- > Evident commitment to self-improvement through education.
- > Evident ability to promote the values of a Christian intercultural community.
- > Evident concern for the needs of the poor and marginalized.
- > Evident leadership ability within Church-related activities and organizations.
- > Evident ability to benefit from financial assistance.

Continuation Awards:

Once a student becomes a Presidential Scholarship recipient, continuation awards of \$3,000 per year through graduation from Divine Word College are contingent upon the recipient maintaining satisfactory academic progress and remaining a student in good standing. A student falling below the minimum Divine Word College GPA will be given a grace period of one semester to bring their cumulative GPA back to the minimum, without forfeiture of the scholarship. A student placed on formation probation for disciplinary reasons may forfeit the Presidential Scholarship; depending on the decision of the Dean of Students and President.
