Witness to the Kingdom

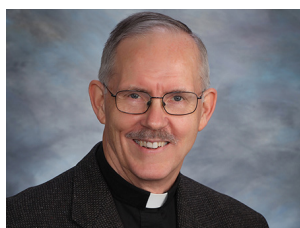
The purpose of missionary service is to give witness to the dawning of the Kingdom. That is the focus and mission of the whole Church. Jesus teaches us to pray "Thy kingdom come! Thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven." Jesus himself announced the kingdom saying, "the kingdom of God is at hand." Jesus also sends his disciples into the whole world to be his witnesses to resurrection and the coming new life for the world. *We* are witnesses.



There are many other words and expressions for the reality that we announce. Matthew's Gospel speaks of the *Kingdom of Heaven*. Paul wrote about a *New Creation*. St. Augustine wrote about building the *City of God*, and yearning for the New Jerusalem. Some contemporary theologians prefer to write about the *Reign of God*. St. Paul VI and St. John Paul II urged that we look to a *New Civilization of Love*.

This past Sunday, the Solemnity of Christ the King focused our attention on the end of time. As we come to the end of the liturgical year, we look forward to the coming of the Kingdom in all of its glory. Though we have not yet arrived, we are well on the way. Some special moments that remind us that the kingdom is really very close.

A story comes to mind. In 1901, a diplomat was invited to London for the coronation of Edward VII and his wife Alexandra as king and queen of the United Kingdom. When the diplomat returned home he was asked what was the most "royal thing" he witnessed.



He answered "While there were many beautiful and regal moments in the many ceremonies, the most impressive thing I saw

occurred on my way back to my hotel one cold evening. On a doorstep I saw a poor young boy shivering as he sat with his little sister. He had taken off his coat and wrapped his sister in it to keep her warm. That was the most kingly moment.”

On Thursday, DWC will present a Matthew 25 award. It is given to people in the local area who are living out Jesus’ teaching as remembered in the 25th chapter of Matthew’s gospel. There Jesus told a story of a king who spoke to some members of a gathered crowd, “Come, you who are blessed by my Father. Inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world. For I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me drink, a stranger and you welcomed me...”

This year we will celebrate seeing something “royal” in the work of the people at the Lantern Center in Dubuque. Ms. Megan Ruiz, the executive director of the Center will be with us to receive the award on behalf of the many people working there to welcome strangers and immigrants to the Dubuque area. Jesus said “whatever you did for one of these least brothers (or sisters) of mine, you did for me.”

The Kingdom sometimes seems like it is a long ways off, but when we witness acts of selfless hospitality, we know that the kingdom is already here among us. At his second coming, at the end of time, the King appears among the hungry, the thirsty and the strangers. Strange, isn’t it, that in his first coming in Bethlehem, the King appeared as a hungry baby, laid in the manger, a place for animals to eat? Thank God Joseph and Mary were there to welcome him. Thank God that we are here now.

Capstone presentations provide an opportunity for students to showcase their learning and research in areas of particular interest under faculty member guidance. In an effort to mitigate the exaggerated emphasis that has developed around capstone presentations over recent years, here are some key points to keep in mind:

- Capstone presentations will not be video recorded or live streamed
- Capstone presentations will take place in the assigned room as noted, not in room 107 nor in the main chapel
- Capstone presentation will be followed by a brief period for questions and discussion
- Attendance is limited to no more than 10 students invited by the presenter from the same academic degree program major field
 - For example, a THM capstone presenter may invite up to a maximum of 10 declared THM major students
 - Any THM/PHI faculty member may attend any THM/PHI presentation
 - No outside guests

Matthew 25 Award

This Thursday, November 20, 2023, Divine Word College will host the Matthew 25 Award ceremony. This ceremony will begin with vespers at 6:00 pm in the main chapel, followed by a banquet in the dining room. All students are required to attend, and we ask that you dress in formal attire for the special occasion.

Tips for Preparing Final Exams

1. Gather all materials: collect all you need to review: textbooks, notes, handouts, etc.
2. Make a “realistic” schedule:
 - a. Set priorities
 - b. Schedule enough time to study each subject
 - c. Spend one or two hours to review and rehearse what you have studied. It is not good if you try to study something new at this point.
3. Begin your actual study with a “not more” than 30 minutes’ warm up: to review everything in the subject. This will help you to remember some of the topics you have learned during the semester.
4. Create a detailed listing of all significant information you will need to know for the exams. This step includes skimming all your notes, texts, and other materials. Write out each topic as you come across it in your quick review. This step is similar to making a synthesis of your course.
5. Based on your listing, review the material intensely.
6. Practice a lot of output: teaching to material to your peer, making flashcards and using them, drawing mind maps, and writing.
7. Test yourself: go to a topic and try to explain it in your own words on what you understand, what the important information you need to know and the implication and/or application in the reality.
8. Repeat steps 5 to 7 until you feel confident with it.
9. Practical details:
 - a. Know the format of the exams: multiple choice, essay, true/false, etc.
 - b. Know the time and the place of the exams.
 - c. Prepare spare pens, pencils, erasers, etc.
10. Make your own questions to practice.
11. Dealing with anxiety: relaxation and focus techniques work best to overcome a panic attack during the exams. You also need to remember that an exam is only a text of your recall of a body of knowledge in a specific time and format. This is not a test of your self-worth.
