#### *Holy, Healing Wounds*

The Gospel readings for the Sundays after Easter have a lot to tell us about *Missionary Discipleship*. According to Luke's Gospel, on the evening of the resurrection when Jesus met the disciples in the upper room, he showed them his wounds. He said, "Look at my hands and my feet... touch me and see!" A week later the disciples were gathered again in the upper room. John's Gospel reports that this time Thomas was there, and Jesus said to Thomas, "Put your finger here and see my hands, and bring your hand and put it into my side...." Thomas believed and said: "My Lord and my God!"



Luke finishes the story with Jesus' words to the disciples: "You are witnesses of these things." I take two lessons from these Easter appearances.

*All of us are witnesses.* Sometimes we get the impression that missionary witness is only for certain people in the Church. Maybe it is for popes and bishops and priests and deacons and Sisters and Brothers. Unfortunately, the clericalism embedded in the Church makes our witness to the world so much less effective. The truth is, missionary discipleship is a call to every member of the Church.

A story comes to mind: There was a large corporation that was moving its headquarters across the country. The president of the corporation announced that most of the essential employees would relocate along with the headquarters. However, the secretaries, receptionists and other workers would not be moving. These "non-essential" workers were angered by such dismissive treatment; their response was to refuse to answer phone calls or emails for the important people! After a day of turmoil, the president made a public apology!



No sane pastor of a parish would make such a foolish mistake. The work of parish secretaries is absolutely essential. As a missionary, I well know that parents, grandparents, neighbors, friends, and children too, are essential witnesses to the good news of Easter among all the nations.

**Wounds give witness.** When Jesus appeared to his disciples, he showed his wounds. What a surprising and intimate gesture! I think of a small child who gets a scrape or a cut and runs crying to his mother. The child, perhaps fearing the sting of an antiseptic, or frightened by the blood, holds tightly to the wound. The mother must coax and encourage the child to uncover the wound to see what can be done. When the child is confident and trusting, he will show the wound to his mom.

I wonder why Jesus would so easily and openly show his wounds. I suppose it is because he has confidence in his disciples, even though they abandoned him on the day of his death. He doesn't need treatment of the wounds; instead, by uncovering his wounds in such a moment, they help heal his relationship with his disciples.

It is said that Satan once appeared to the great mystic saint, Teresa of Avila, disguised as Jesus. She knew instantly that he was a fraud. Enraged, the devil demanded to know where his deception had failed. She told him simply, "You have no wounds."

When we are wounded we are often fearful or angry or both. Testimony that comes from self-defense or self-righteousness is generally feeble and thin. When it comes from the courage to reconcile, it overflows with inspiring power. Our own wounds can help heal others. Jesus is our example; he is the wounded healer who says – come and touch the wound, and be my witness.


### HLC Annual Conference 2024

Dr. Yasmin Rioux and Dr. John Szukalski attended the Higher Learning Commission annual conference from April 13-16, 2024, in Chicago, IL. They also presented a concurrent session on DWC's experience with assessment entitled, "Building a Mission-Driven, Coherent & Sustainable Assessment Protocol." Here's the abstract:

This presentation provides a replicable model for small undergraduate institutions confronting broken, ineffective, and irrelevant assessment practices. Institutions embarking on this challenge require close collaboration among faculty and administrators, clear and frequent communication, compromise and flexibility, and the steady positive stamina to keep moving forward amid inevitable disagreements and failures. Addresses specific moments within a pilot project, including: setting the scope, fostering shared understandings, creating a sense of urgency, retrieving the Mission, articulating Core Competencies, and aligning the Core Curriculum. Draws heavily on faculty experience, administrator perspectives, and Assessment Academy learnings to create the relevant infrastructure for assessing and improving student learning and program effectiveness. Presentation participants will explore how this model might be replicated in their own institution.

Our presentation received great feedback by faculty and administrators from other institutions confronting assessment protocol challenges. Here's an email received after we delivered our presentation:

*Hi Dr. Szukalski, It was a pleasure to meet you today at HLC! I had read the summary of your presentation and checked it off last night as a "must attend", thinking we have a similar situation at my college, where we're trying to rebuild our assessment process too. And then amazingly, I had the chance to talk with you this morning. I just wanted to say thanks to both you and Dr. Rioux for your outstanding presentation about how your college developed an assessment framework that was doable and sustainable. That was the most valuable advice on how to build or rebuild an assessment plan that I've ever received. Much gratitude to you.*

## The Fear of Change and Why We Are Afraid of Change

Change and fear are connected. We are afraid of change because we have no control over the outcome. Human nature dictates that we want things to unfold just as we envision them. We do not like surprises. In his book *The Dance of Fear*, Harriet Lerner, PhD, states that “There are two things that will never change: the will to change and the fear of change” (pp. 73).

Change is a constant in life. We never stop growing and learning. The human life is not eternal. One day, we were born, and the next, we will return to dust. The decision to stay set rather than change can be more challenging. We can stay caught up in our professional and personal relationships, if we do not keep evolving. The paradox is that humans can evolve and change even as we reject uncertainty. Fear obstructs our vision, making it difficult to see our full potential. We, too, close the door to receive God’s grace for transformation.

Indeed, it is challenging to change. Our brain’s natural tendency is to reject uncertainty. It would rather have a negative, known outcome than an unknown one. However, our minds are adaptable and flexible. We can train our minds to adapt to the change.

Furthermore, our life stories, both real and imaginative, cause our fear of change. We narrate our lives as if someone is writing them. We have to acknowledge that we write our storylines. We are not the victims of life circumstances. This is beyond our control. However, we can control how we respond to them.

### Why do we fear change?

#### 1. We feed our brains with uncertainties.

Our brain is so powerful and likes to be in control. The brain needs assurance. The uncertainty causes our limbic system to go into a high alert. That is why we are worried with things that might not happen.

#### 2. We know the fact that nothing in life is permanent.

Knowing that life has to change does not mean we will easily deal with change. We hold on to our status, position, job, and relationship. We refuse to move one. We keep repeating the old stories instead of embracing our minds to what is next. The study on bridging the gaps between Western psychology and Buddhism demonstrates how accepting impermanence breaks the destructive cycles of ruminating. We can relax once we acknowledge and admit that every tale in life has an end.

#### 3. We are afraid of failure.

We are afraid of failure. No one on earth ever fails. When we hold on to the belief that we must be perfect and in control, we will make more mistakes. We need to reframe how we deal with our life’s uncertainty, impermanence, and perfectionism.

## NEW! Library FAQ page

Did you know that the online catalog now has an [FAQ page](#)? It has answers to frequently asked questions like “*how do I log in to my library account?*”, “*how do I renew my books?*”, and “*what is interlibrary loan?*” Go to the library’s online catalog [https://opac.dwci.edu/](https://opac.dwci.edu) and click “Library FAQs” on the right-hand side of the page.

There are multiple ways to find answers to your questions. If you don’t see the category you are looking for on the main page, you can enter questions in the search box at the top of the page or you can use the chat box at the bottom right-hand side of the page. Apollo (tawk.to’s AI assistant) is able to answer most FAQs about the library. Here is a transcript of a chat I had with Apollo\*:

To find articles, you can use the library’s online resources such as EBSCO Academic Search Complete, EBSCO Newspaper Source Plus, ProQuest Linguistics Collection, JSTOR journals, and JSTOR eBooks. These databases contain a wide range of articles on various topics. You can access them through the library’s website.



what is interlibrary loan?



Interlibrary loan is a service that allows DWC community members to borrow materials from other libraries. This includes books, DVDs, and articles. To request an interlibrary loan, you need to fill out an Interlibrary Loan request form for each item that is needed and send this ILL form to Br.
