
Serving on the vocations team is far more than being a recruiter. It is a ministry, akin to the opening scenes in Jesus' public ministry. I especially like a moment from the first chapter of John's Gospel, in which Philip invites his friend Nathanael (*John 1: 43-46*).

The next day Jesus decided to go to Galilee, and he found Philip. And Jesus said to him, "Follow me." Now Philip was from Bethsaida, the town of Andrew and Peter. Philip found Nathanael and told him, "We have found the one about whom Moses wrote in the law, and also the prophets, Jesus, son of Joseph, from Nazareth."

But Nathanael said to him, "Can anything good come from Nazareth?" Philip said to him, "Come and see."




This year, DWC community is reading together a book about vocations: *Called Beyond Our Selves: Vocation and the Common Good.* Its opening pages focus attention on a memorable insight of Frederick Buechner, who was a Presbyterian minister and writer in New England.

This afternoon, faculty, staff and SVD community members gathered to reflect on that insight and discuss ways to weave the journey of vocational discernment more deeply into the life of DWC.

ITEST is an association of theologians, scientists, technology specialists, clergy, teachers, students, and others committed to a Catholic world view in which faith and science collaborate in exploring the truth. ITEST explores truth theologically in the wisdom traditions of the human community and in the data studied in the sciences. It is organized from the Cardinal Rigali Center in St. Louis, MO.

The Director of ITEST writes in his introduction to the website:



In the fewest possible words, our theme is "Be Not Afraid." ITEST does not see science as the enemy of religion but stresses their mutual compatibility as parallel pathways toward knowledge.

St. Augustine said (400 CE) that "the book of nature and the book of scripture were both written by the same Author, and they cannot be in conflict when properly interpreted and understood." ITEST agrees with that completely. The dialog that we have maintained for 50+ years begins from the belief that God revealed scientific knowledge for a purpose: to use it wisely for the betterment of all humankind. God's word in scripture is similarly intended, with a richness that transcends human experience. We view the role of religious faith in human history optimistically. Our task is to travel both paths toward God. ITEST strives to have theology and science/technology encounter each other.

Instead, we can view accreditation as a way of keeping ourselves accountable for the quality education we promise to all students in all of our programs. Preliminary Survey Results

As part of the NetVUE Professional Development Grant awarded to DWC, faculty recently completed a survey on their understanding of vocation and how to support student discernment. The preliminary results of the survey demonstrate that the faculty have a strong commitment to vocation, the college, and to students in discerning vocation. They also indicate areas of opportunity, particularly in providing additional professional development and engagement opportunities for faculty to learn more about vocation within the Arnoldus Family educational mission and tools for supporting students. A detailed report with results and analysis will be published soon.






Preliminary Survey Results


I can articulate the connection between DWC's institutional mission and the concept of vocation




I feel equipped to advise students on their vocational path as a missionary.



Conference for Men and Women Religious in Temporary Vows – *Time Management*







Phishing is when someone tries to trick or deceive you into revealing personal information, like your passwords, banking and credit card details, or social security number.



Phishing is a **cybercrime** in which a target or targets are contacted by email, telephone, text message or other online platforms by someone posing as a legitimate institution to lure individuals into providing sensitive data such as personally identifiable information that can then be used for ill intent.

Think before you click! Divine Word College is not exempt from phishing attempts. Protect yourself and your personal information.

Please sign up by October 23rd. Those who sign up and donate will receive a \$20 gift card from "Impact Life."





Banned Books Week Library Display – October 5-11, 2025

The Library has many books that have been challenged or banned for various reasons, *including the Bible*. Stop by the library and check out the banned books display!

Banned Books Week was launched in 1982 in response to a sudden surge in the number of challenges to books in libraries, bookstores, and schools. Held in the last week of September or first week of October, the annual event highlights the value of free and open access to information and brings together the entire book community — librarians, educators, authors, publishers, booksellers, and readers of all types — in shared support of the freedom to seek and to express ideas (https://bannedbooksweek.org/).

Why does book banning occur?

Book bans occur for a variety of reasons, including moral or religious objections, political or ideological concerns, controversial portrayals of race or culture, depictions of sexuality, graphic violence or trauma, LGBTQ+ themes, offensive language or profanity, and even misunderstandings or mistaken identities.

The Roman Catholic Church had its own "banned books list" known as the <u>Index Librorum Prohibitorum</u> (Index of Forbidden Books). It was maintained by from 1559 until it was officially abolished in 1966 by Pope Paul VI, reflecting the Church's evolving approach to engaging with the modern world following the reforms of the Second Vatican Council.



In a 2024 letter on the role of literature in human formation, Pope Francis affirmed the enduring value of reading—not just for personal growth, but for cultural dialogue. He wrote:

"Literature also proves essential for believers who sincerely seek to enter into dialogue with the culture of their time, or simply with the lives and experiences of other people. With good reason, the Second Vatican Council observed that, "literature and art... seek to penetrate our nature" and "throw light on our suffering and joy, our needs and potentialities.""
