What Is Prophetic About Dialogue?

Dialogue is prophetic when it points the way to the Kingdom of God, insists on radical inclusion, and gives public witness to deepening bonds of solidarity.

Dialogue for the Kingdom. Missionary service today focuses on dialogue for the Kingdom. Jesus sent out his early disciples, two by two, with these instructions:

"Whatever town you enter and they welcome you, eat what is set before you, cure the sick in it and say to them, 'The kingdom of God is at hand for you.'" (Luke 10:8-9)

Of course, dialogue can take many forms. It can exist among thieves, but such conversation would likely be one of conspiracy. Dialogue can occur among politicians, though often it is little more than a discussion about power. Dialogue can also be had among church people, but if it does not hold Jesus' instructions at heart, it risks becoming little more than a contest of one-upmanship.

Missionaries, along with all Christians, are called to give witness with their lives that God's Kingdom is near. That is the core of Jesus' prophesy.

Dialogue of Radical Inclusion.

A distinctive element in missionary dialogue is its focus on universality and diversity. From the time of St. Paul, missionaries have insisted that the Kingdom is open to *everyone* and that *differences* are not merely tolerated but welcome. In 2000, the SVD General Chapter affirmed:





"From the time of our Founder we have always felt called to share in the mission of Jesus 'to proclaim the Kingdom of God's love' (Prologue to SVD Constitutions). In our call to pass over to other cultures and in our charism of internationality, the particular contribution that we are called to make in witnessing to the Reign of God is to highlight its universal inclusiveness and its openness to diversity. Indeed our SVD identity is rooted in this call to bear witness to God's love precisely in situations where its inclusive embrace is not recognized and where its openness to the rich diversity of peoples is not appreciated." (2000 General Chapter, # 48)

Dialogue Itself as a Public Sign.

Fundamentally, prophetic dialogue is the work of the Holy Spirit drawing us together in solidarity. As people take notice, the encounters themselves become prophetic signs.



Ideally, missionaries do not enter dialogue with a know-it-all attitude. Rather, they approach encounters with people of other faith traditions, with the poor and marginalized, with people of other cultures and with faith-seekers as occasions of fascination and hope. For those called to prophetic dialogue, differences are not threats—they are invitations.

When such dialogue matures beyond the private sphere, it becomes a public witness to the power of the Holy Spirit, gathering all of humanity to unity. Drawn together in the Spirit of oneness, formed by the Word of God, and welcomed by the Creator of all peoples, we come to the deep realization that we all belong to one another.

In dialogue, we foster solidarity, respect and love. As we journey together with our dialogue partners, we uncover the depths of our shared humanity, grow in mutual regard for one another, and receive and extend an invitation to deep friendship. Such mature dialogue itself becomes a *prophetic sign*—a foretaste of humanity's future in God.

Dangerous Work. When SVDs gathered for the 2000 General Chapter, they were clear-eyed about both the long-term promise and the short-term risks of prophetic dialogue.

"It has become clear that prophetic witness to the Gospel necessarily brings with it the opposition of the powerful and the oppressors, be they of the Left or the Right. Religious missionaries are called to be unconditionally on the side of the oppressed, to be martyrs (i.e., witnesses) to the radical following of Jesus in the living out of his concrete options in our own contexts." (2000 General Chapter, #28)

Prophetic Dialogue at DWC. Is there any prophetic dialogue at DWC? Truth be told, I find it everywhere I look.

Recently, I walked into the dining room to fetch a cup of coffee and was surprised to see seven tables where ESL students were being coached by conversation partners from Emmaus Bible College, from among the archdiocesan college seminarians, and from friends here in Epworth. A couple of SVD Brothers were also lending a hand. The students came from Vietnam, Haiti, and China.

I am continually amazed and encouraged by the courage of students who immerse themselves in learning a new language—and equally impressed by the patience and generosity of instructors, tutors, and members of the DWC community. Many friendships and bonds of mutual appreciation have been born in our dining room.

Later in the week, I had the opportunity to talk with Sr. Precious and Sr. Charity from Zimbabwe. Their home language is Shona, and I was delighted to learn that Shona has no word for *stranger!* The instinct of the Shona people, when meeting someone new, is not to focus on difference but to seek what unites.

St. Josef Freinademetz, SVD expressed the same truth in his own way: "The language that all people understand is LOVE."

And that, indeed, is the most prophetic thing about prophetic dialogue.







From Puerto Rico to Newark – Prophetic Dialogue for a DWC Alumnus

For Fr. Miguel Virella, SVD, the seeds of his vocation were planted early. Growing up in Puerto Rico as the oldest of five children, faith was part of the fabric of daily life—especially through his grandparents. "My grandparents were the main influence in my religious upbringing and faith," he said. "That's where everything started—with them."

As a boy, he was already drawn to the priesthood, often pretending to celebrate Mass for his siblings and friends by distributing crackers as the Eucharist. But as he grew older, that dream faded to the background—until a transformative experience at age 17 reignited it. Through the charismatic movement at his parish, he felt a powerful encounter with God. "It was not only about going to church or following the expectations of religion," he said. "It was really from the heart."

Having spent several summers working in restaurants in Newark, New Jersey, where his uncles were chefs, Fr. Miguel was already familiar with life in the mainland United States. Those visits, along with the renewed faith he found in the youth group, eventually led him to enter formation with a religious community called the Servites. In 1984, he enrolled at Divine Word College in Epworth, Iowa to refine his English and take some early undergraduate courses.

At DWC, he found a place that felt like home. Those two years not only strengthened his English and philosophy skills but also immersed him in a welcoming community. He was deeply moved by the diversity, the warmth of the SVD family, and mentors who showed him genuine care. He still remembers their encouragement when he struggled with discernment. "Those are things you keep in your mind—that there is a connection," he said. "They cared."

Ordained a Divine Word Missionary Priest in 1996, Fr. Miguel has spent his priesthood serving in the Archdiocese of Newark, New Jersey—working primarily with immigrant and low-income communities. "That's our charism—working with the poor," he said. "People who may be limited materially, but who are full of love and who really dedicate themselves to the community."

In his early years of ministry, he served in several culturally diverse parishes, often celebrating Mass in both Spanish and English. He spent 23 years in one parish that later merged with others under his leadership. Guiding these communities through transition required patience, compassion, and a focus on unity, healing, and shared mission. "The building was in bad condition," he recalled. "One Wednesday, they told us, 'You have to move.' So we called everybody and said 'Next Sunday Mass is going to be in the other church.' We traveled like the people of Israel. Everybody came. No problem, no fights. We just went."

Over the years, he has guided parishes through transitions and growth, always focused on helping people strengthen their faith and live it more deeply. "It gives me the most joy to see the community have a personal relationship with God," he said. "It's not only about coming to church and doing things right—it's about having a personal relationship with God."

Today, Fr. Miguel continues to serve in New Jersey, ministering to both Hispanic and Irish parishioners. He remains passionate about lay formation, leading Bible classes and workshops that help people understand their faith more deeply and share it with others. "That's part of our charism and mission," he said. "We do a lot of formation for the laity—to help them do ministry outside of the parish." Now nearly three decades into ministry, Fr. Miguel continues to find meaning in walking with others on their faith journeys. "Sometimes through the people, I learn more about myself, and through the people, I also see God," he reflected.

Fr. Miguel still recalls a conversation with a spiritual director during his formation with the Servites that left a lasting impact. The director asked why he wanted to remain on the path to the priesthood. "I think of Moses, who didn't know exactly where he was going, but he believed. I would like to journey the same way—until my hair is white," he remembers telling him. "I love it. I wouldn't change it for anything. I'm very happy being an SVD priest."



Fire Safety Awareness

Divine Word College will be conducting a fire drill in the coming weeks. Please be prepared to evacuate quickly and safely following the procedures outlined below. Familiarize yourself with evacuation routes, exits, and assembly points. This knowledge is critical during a real emergency.

5.08.02 Policy Handbook on Fire:



When the fire alarm goes off leave the building immediately through the nearest exit! Walk fast, do not run!



Proceed to the soccer field. Students should gather by your formation groups. Employees (faculty and non-faculty) should gather together. SVD members should gather together.



Stay on the field until the fire department gives the "all-clear" signal. If you are unable to return to the main building, proceed to Megan Hall. If you reside at Megan Hall and are unable to return to the building, proceed to the main building.



Contact persons are assigned to each formation group. They are to inform the fire department if someone is





missing in their group. No one but the Fire Department is to go back into the building to look for someone who is missing. Beware of emergency equipment that will come on campus.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION

When the fire alarm sounds, you should receive a text message indicating that we are conducting a fire drill. If you do not get a "fire drill" text message, please see Kimberly <u>after</u> the drill is over. Once the fire alarm goes off, move quickly to the parking lot near the

soccer field. DO NOT RUN! DO NOT LOOK FOR FRIENDS. Get out of the building. Once you are at the soccer field you should break into groups (please stay in your group so we can do roll call) as follows:

If you are a student, you should gather by formation groups. Fr. Tuan will take roll. Employees should gather together. Jeffrey Puccio will take roll. SVD should gather together. Fr. Simon will take roll. Once the fire alarm has stopped sounding and roll has been taken you will be released to return to the building. Please do not return to the building until you have released by your group leader.



Desktop vs. Online Apps – What's the Difference?

Most of us are used to opening Word, Outlook, or Excel from our desktop. But did you know that every Microsoft 365 app also has an online version you can access from any browser? Just go to https://www.office.com/ and Sign In using your dwci.edu email address and password.

Here's a quick guide to help you decide when to use the **desktop version** and when the **online version** might be more convenient.



Desktop Version: Pros & Cons

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Pros:

- Full features and advanced tools (especially in Word, Excel, and PowerPoint)
- Works offline
- Familiar interface for long-time users
- Better for large or complex files

Cons:

- Requires installation and updates
- Tied to one device
- Files may be saved locally unless synced with OneDrive

Online Version: Pros & Cons



Pros:

- Accessible from any device with internet (including your smart phone or tablet)
- Auto-saves to OneDrive
- Great for collaboration (real-time editing)
- No installation needed

Cons:

- Fewer advanced features
- Requires internet connection
- May feel different from desktop layout

Quick Tip:

If you're working on a shared document or switching between devices, try using the **online version.** For formatting-heavy tasks or offline work, stick with the **desktop version.**

You can always open a document in one and switch to the other — just look for the "Open in Desktop App" button in the online version!
