Why was Jesus Baptized?

“Righteous, man! That’s righteous!”

Quite a few years ago (especially in the mid-1980s), young men in the Midwest made just such enthusiastic affirmations. While *righteousness* generally expresses moral or theological concerns, the word has a broader underlying meaning. Historically it comes from Old English *rihtwis*, meaning something that is *rightwise* or *fitting*.

This past Sunday, in telling the story of Jesus’ baptism, the Gospel focused on what is truly righteous. John the Baptist protested that he should not be baptizing Jesus, but rather that Jesus should be baptizing him. Jesus replied, “Allow it now, for thus it is fitting for us to fulfill all righteousness.” (Mt 3:15)



The baptism that John preached stressed conversion, turning away from sin to follow the way of the Lord. John rightly recognized that Jesus didn’t need a conversion from sin, yet Jesus willingly submitted to baptism. The Spirit appeared as a dove, and a voice was heard from heaven, “This is my beloved Son, with whom I am well pleased.” (Mt 3:16) In the slang of forty years ago, God was saying, “Righteous!”

So why was Jesus baptized?

Jesus' baptism was not a onetime event confined to the Jordan; it encompasses his whole mission. Matthew tells of Jesus teaching, healing, welcoming, forgiving, and ultimately abandoning himself completely to God's will. Such is the righteousness that Jesus' baptism proclaims.



Baptism opens the doorway to new life. It is amazingly “righteous” that in death, Jesus sacrificed his life for us and then was resurrected. As Matthew's Gospel puts it, Jesus becomes the narrow doorway (Mt 7:13) to the fullness of life in the Kingdom of Heaven.

Jesus' baptism was never meant only for Jesus.

It was meant for all of Jesus' followers. They all belonged in the same band of disciples, whether Jewish or Gentile. Matthew concludes his Gospel with a commission for his disciples to baptize all nations in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit (Mt: 28:19), just as the Father and Spirit were present with Jesus at the Jordan.

What, then, is the meaning of Christian baptism?

As for Jesus, **our baptism is not one-time event** that


Welcome Back!

New Statement on Social Media Approved

At its December meeting, the Board of Administration approved a new *Statement on Social Media Postings* for Divine Word College employees.



This statement provides clear guidance on the responsible use of personal social media accounts, emphasizing professionalism, respect, and alignment with the College's mission and values.

Statement on Social Media Postings

Social media is a powerful tool for communication, storytelling, and community engagement. At Divine Word College (DWC), we value openness, respect, and the responsible use of these platforms. Because employees represent both themselves and the college in different ways, this statement provides guidance for employees posting about or in relation to DWC on their personal social media accounts.

When using personal social media accounts, Divine Word College employees are expected to follow all applicable College policies and the principles outlined in the DWC Handbook. These principles include, but are not limited to, the following:

- **Section 5.02 – Mission and Values:** Social media activity should align with the College's mission and values, promoting integrity, respect, and service. Posts that conflict with these principles are not acceptable.
- **Section 5.21 – Use of College Resources:** College resources, including time and technology, should not be misused for personal social media activity during work hours or in ways that interfere with job responsibilities.
- **Section 6.05 – Respect for Others:** Employees should demonstrate respect for colleagues, students, and the broader community in all online interactions. Harassment, bullying, or disparaging remarks are strictly prohibited.
- **Section 6.07.02 – Professional Conduct:** All postings should reflect professionalism and uphold the reputation of Divine Word College. Avoid language, images, or comments that

could be considered offensive, discriminatory, or damaging to the College's mission.

- **Section 7.04 – Confidentiality:** Employees must respect the confidentiality of College information, student records, and internal communications. Do not share sensitive or proprietary information on social media platforms.

Employees are reminded that their online presence can reflect on Divine Word College. Exercise good judgment, maintain professionalism, and ensure that your personal postings do not compromise the College's reputation or violate its policies.


Greg is a faculty member in the School of Communication and Journalism at Eastern Illinois University. He recently completed a Master of Arts in Studio Arts at EIU, where he reached a new depth in the exploration of photography as a conceptual and expressive medium, work that culminated in the creation of **ANTITHESIS**.

ANTITHESIS is the first time the seasoned photojournalist has pushed against the conventional boundaries of photographic art. "Rules do not limit my art, nor is it confined by a viewer's ability to comprehend what's in the photograph," said Greg, who challenges the viewer's expectations of clarity and precision through this body of work.

The artist's intent is to provoke visceral, emotional responses, inviting his audience to engage through the right hemisphere instead of the analytical mind. "I find it arrogant for humanity to believe that beauty exists only within clarity," he said, noting his shift from the literal space of journalism into the imaginative, memory provoking realm of the arts.

Images in the **ANTITHESIS** collection are intentionally untitled. After viewing the show, we invite you to imagine a name for your favorite image and submit it to the Title Contest.
