## Hearts Awakened

Last Saturday, DWC held our annual celebration of St. Josephine Bakhita. She was born free in Sudan, but at a very young age she was kidnapped, sold into slavery, tortured and abused. She was taken to Italy, freed from slavery, experienced a profound closeness to God the Father, asked for Baptism, and eventually joined the Canossian Sisters. For more than fifty years she worked at a school in northern Italy, welcoming the students as they entered, and blessed them on their way home. She became a sister to all the people. She died in 1947 and was canonized in 2000. St. John Paul II proclaimed her as our “universal sister.”

Our College celebration had a rather complicated theme: “Healing Wounds and Building True Peace and Justice by a Culture of Encounter”. The Gospel reading (Mt 25:1-13) recounted Jesus’ story of the wise and foolish virgins! How do you put all that together? **Deacon Arnold Formbi, SVD** was on hand to present the homily. It was truly a marvel!

## Homily by Deacon Arnold Formbi, SVD

**Stay Awake.** My friends, our theme today names something every one of us longs for: a world where people are seen, where dignity is honored, where wounds are met with compassion. And into that longing, Jesus gives us a parable of wise and foolish virgins. His conclusion is simple and direct: “Stay awake.” I don’t think he’s talking about our eyes; he’s talking about the heart.

I once had a classmate. He was brilliant, thoughtful, kind. But every day, somewhere in the middle of class, he would start to nod off. One day I asked him, “Are you bored?” He said, “No ... I’m just tired. I work late. I’m far from home.

I'm trying to keep up. Sometimes my body just can't do it." And it struck me: he wasn't sleeping because he didn't care; he was sleeping because he was carrying too much.



A lot of us have hearts like that. A sleepy heart isn't a bad heart. It's a tired heart. A heart overwhelmed by stress, or loneliness, or pressure, or wounds no one sees. A heart that slowly shuts down because it's been carrying more than it can hold.

**Awake and Sleepy Virgins.** This is exactly what Jesus is talking about in today's Gospel. The parable of the wise and foolish virgins is not about being perfect or flawlessly prepared. It's about attentiveness of heart. The wise virgins aren't better people, they are simply awake. Their lamps stay lit because their hearts remain open, expectant, ready to recognize God when He draws near. The foolish virgins aren't wicked. They're just unawake. Their lamps go out because their hearts have grown tired, distracted, overwhelmed, the way our hearts do when life becomes too heavy.

Jesus is telling us that the real danger is not failure, not imperfection, not weakness. The real danger is a heart that has fallen asleep, a heart that no longer notices God's presence, no longer sees the people around it, no longer expects grace to break in. So, when Jesus says, "Stay awake," He is inviting us to keep the lamp of the heart burning, to stay open, attentive, ready for encounter.

**Bakhita's Experience.** St. Josephine Bakhita's early life could have put her heart to sleep forever. Trauma does that. Displacement does that. Being far from home does that. But something in her stayed awake, awake to hope, awake to dignity, awake to the possibility that God had not forgotten her. And when she finally encountered people who saw her, people who treated her with gentleness, who spoke her name with respect, who looked at her with the eyes of Christ, her heart woke up fully.

That is how her healing began. Not with a miracle, but with an encounter. Her life reminds us that love is not always met with gratitude. Kindness is not always understood. Forgiveness is not always returned. And yet, the Christian heart loves anyway.

**Love Anyway.** There is a prayer often associated with Mother Teresa that captures this so simply. It says that people may misunderstand you, accuse you, forget the good you do, or fail to appreciate your efforts but choose goodness anyway. Choose mercy anyway. Choose love anyway.

In the end, it is not about how others respond. It is about who God calls you to be. A sleepy heart waits for perfect conditions. An awake heart loves anyway.



Healing wounds begins when someone is seen. Peace begins when someone is welcomed. Justice begins when someone's dignity is honored. A culture of encounter is simply this: hearts that refuse to fall asleep. Hearts that stay awake to God, awake to one another, awake to the stories, cultures, and struggles of the people around us.



**Is Your Heart Sleepy?** So today, let me ask you: Where is your heart sleepy? Where is it tired or overwhelmed? Where do you need God to rekindle the flame?

And also: Who around you might be carrying more than you know? Who needs you to notice them, to welcome them, to help their heart wake up again?

The God who kept Bakhita's lamp burning in the darkest night is the same God who keeps ours burning too. And through us, He builds a world where peace and justice are not distant dreams, but encounters, real, human, holy encounters, one person at a time.

### Open Pathway Chosen for Accreditation Cycle

The Board of Administration, upon endorsement by the Faculty Senate, voted to pursue the [Open Pathway](#) offered by the Higher Learning Commission. Additionally, the Board, also endorsed by the Faculty Senate, voted to complete a Student Success Initiative instead of the virtual mid cycle review that other institutions may take.
