Missionary Spirituality – Did You Miss the Boat?

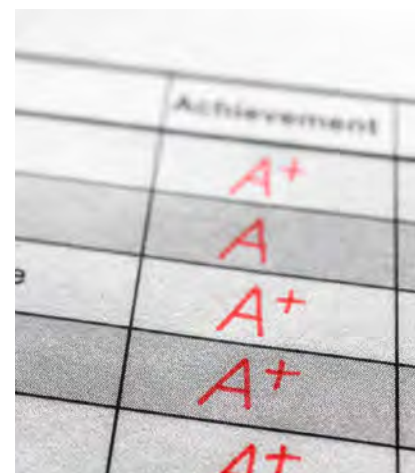
It is exam week, and the air is thick with anxiety over grades. While that is normal, some students take it to an extreme.

I often propose a thought experiment to students at DWC: If you had to choose between receiving an A in a subject while learning very little, or receiving a B- but opening yourself to a world of transformative knowledge, what would you choose? For students worldwide, this is a true-life test. It is especially poignant for those raised in East Asian educational systems – such as China, Vietnam, Korea, Japan – where grades are EVERYTHING. This system, developed under Confucian influence, puts tremendous stress on examination results. Ironically, these exams were originally designed to ensure merit over connections with family or friends, yet they can create a different burden.

Throughout the year, I have suggested an essential metric for missionary success. I ask: “Have you made a friend outside of your ethnic group?” This is the core test of intercultural competence. Sadly, many students find they cannot name a single close friend who is different from them.

Years ago, I fell into the “get-an-A trap” myself. Looking back on my college years, I wish I had spent more of myself cultivating friendship. I “missed the boat,” as they say, on the learning that happens outside of the classroom. I had a huge appetite for readings, papers, & exams; I earned the A’s, but I missed out on so many friends around me.

Last week’s Gospel readings focused on Jesus’ teaching at the Last Supper.



He emphasized the core of human and godly existence: “This is my commandment: love one another as I love you” (Jn 15). Courageous openness to others, loving, is the foundation of intercultural growth. During the Sunday liturgy, Fr. Betanora Bako Liba SVD cited a moving hymn by the late Archbishop of Lome, Togo, Nicodème Barrigah-Benissan (1963-2024):

*Intelligence without love produces perversion.
Justice without love makes one unforgiving.
Gentleness without love becomes hypocrisy.
Success without love becomes arrogance.
Wealth without love becomes greed.
Obedience without love makes one a slave.
Beauty without love becomes ridiculous.
Truth without love becomes wounding.
Authority without love turns a person into a tyrant.
Law without love becomes dictatorship.
Faith without love becomes extremism.
The Cross without love is torture.*

*Only love is worthy of faith.
Only love fills us with joy.
Only love shows us the way.
Yes, love is the right choice.*

To this I would add, in a less poetic voice, **an “A” without love is missing the boat.** If you’ve spent too much of this semester focused only on the grade, don’t worry – there is another boat arriving today. Look around, reach out, and be sure to get on board!

Silence and the True Church

These days, many people love making noise wherever they are. Few, however, naturally accept being silent. Still, in my experience, it seems that the True Church is one place where even the noisiest people pause, show respect, and become quiet.

One day, while meditating in the Church, I asked myself why those who love making noise elsewhere do not do so in the True Church. This question leads me to reflect on why the True Church calls for silence, and what the True Church truly is.

According to the Bible and the Catechism, the True Church is the **Bride of Christ** [Revelation 21:2, 9; 22:17] and the **Body of Christ** [Ephesians 4:12–13]. The True Church is built by Jesus. It is a place, a community, that guides people to live according to God’s Word. Jesus entrusted Peter with the mission to continue His work when He said, “*You are Peter, and on this rock, I will build my Church*” [Matthew 16:18]. This means the True Church originates with Jesus, passes through Peter and the apostles, and continues in and through us today.

When we enter the Church building, we encounter the tabernacle, where Jesus remains present in the Blessed Sacrament. Those who are aware of this presence are naturally inclined to avoid disturbances because they recognize the sacredness of God’s dwelling. While God values exuberance, noise, and babies, silence and reverence are also needed. True silence in the Church arises from listening to God first. Whoever trusts in God will seek to hear Him before speaking.

The best kind of silence comes from God. We can close our mouths, but our hearts can still be noisy. Conversely, we can remain calm outwardly while

distractions and chatter around us persist. This shows that merely restraining speech is not true silence, and controlling thoughts is not complete silence either. True silence originates from God, who is always present in the True Church. This **mystical silence** is a gift we may receive when we are deeply connected to Him in prayer and worship. This reflection invites us to deepen our relationship with God through prayer. Children of God are called to seek Him, remain in

His presence, and follow His Word. Encountering God requires silence—listening without distraction, opening our hearts with joy and peace. True silence draws us closer to God and allows us to enjoy the beauty of being in His presence.

Without this mystical silence, we cannot fully experience the life-giving presence of God. Let us seek God with a spirit of silence that allows us to connect with Him without disturbance.

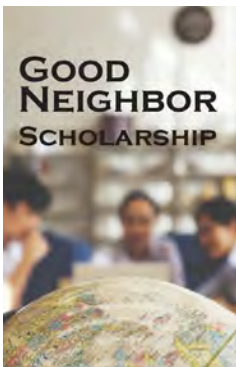
