The Presidential Forum will be held at 12:45 on Thursday afternoon, and Thursday afternoon classes will be held as usual.


The extreme cold of the coming 48 hours are well beyond our normal policies for inclement weather. This is a potentially lifethreatening situation. After consulting with members of the



administration and faculty, it seems the best way to protect life is to close the college temporarily.

St. Joseph Freinademetz – Champion Language Learner

Learning the language of other people is a most important part of missionary life. For many years, Fr. Jon Kirby SVD operated a program to welcome new missionaries to Ghana. He insists that language and culture learning is ALREADY missionary service and not just a preparation for later work. By studying a language, missioners build relationships with local people; they become "belongers" in their new place. In this way, they follow the example of Jesus Christ who became one of us in his incarnation.



As we struggle to learn the most basic parts of a new language, we become "like children". When I was first learning Spanish (about forty years ago!), I remember feeling envy toward the young kids playing in the street in Guadalajara. I figured, if little kids could do it, so could I. Though it is a painful struggle at


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times, we can experience a kind of conversion: we discover a greater willingness to listen and learn, and we discover a doorway into loving the people among whom we make our new home.

St. Joseph Freinademetz would have known the same frustrations and joys that we have as we work to acquire a new language. **He was a champion language learner!** The language he first learned was **Ladino**, the local language of the people of the Alps spreading across Austria, Switzerland and northern Italy. At nine years old, he began to study **Italian** in the local village school. At ten years old, he was also studying **German** with his fellow young students. Later that same year, Joseph left his family home to study at a Secondary School in the nearby city of Brixen.

There he had to redouble his efforts with German, the language of study at his new school. So, he repeated the fourth and fifth grade of elementary school to improve his German before moving forward with higher studies. During the eight years of secondary school, in addition to other subjects, he continued his studies of Italian and German, and added some years of study of Latin, Greek, and French! By twenty years of age he had already studied six languages!

Father Freinademetz was sent to work in China when he was 27 years old. When he arrived in Hong Kong, he studied another language. He went to live in a small fishing village nearby and dedicated himself, heart and soul, to learning **Hakka-Chinese**. After a year of study, he began to preach simple sermons. Then he spent the following year moving from village to visit with people along the way. After two years, in southern China, St. Josef and his partner, John Baptist Anzer, SVD moved to northern China. When they arrived in the province



of Shandong, their first task was, once again – language study. For a year, he dedicated all his time to acquiring basic conversational ability in **Shandong-Chinese**. Then, building on that base, he continued to study and practice as he once again moved from village to village, visiting the people.

Bishop Augustine Henninghaus SVD, a missionary who worked closely with Joseph in China said of him: "He was gifted with quick perception, a retentive memory and a special talent for languages." Joseph never studied English. He would be a very welcome student at Divine Word College!

There is one more language that St. Josef studied throughout his whole life – and he was enormously proficient at it. He always insisted: "The language that all people understand is that of Love."

Proposals to Remove all Tenure and Tenure-Specific Policies
From Official Divine Word College Handbooks and Manuals
(Confirming the existing practice of multi-year renewable faculty contracts)

FACULTY HANDBOOK – Section 250 and associated changes *mutatis mutandis* ADMINISTRATION MANUAL – Section 267 and associated changes *mutatis mutandis*

At Divine Word College, the existing practice for quite some time now has been to offer new and current faculty multi-year renewable contracts. This arrangement has proven most beneficial for faculty, students, and the institution. The below proposals are presented as an acknowledgement of long-existing practice at DWC, and are intended to align and codify that long-existing practice in official policy. Faculty are welcome and encouraged to provide written comments or questions during the indicated 30-day comment period, addressed to Dr. Cunningham as Interim Faculty Senate President, to Dr. Szukalski as VPAA, or to Dr. Ascheman as President.

Proposals:

#1: "Be it resolved that Divine Word College remove all tenure and tenure-specific policies as contained in Section 250 of the Faculty Handbook and make any associated changes contained therein, mutatis mutandis. The effective date of this resolution will be 30 June 2019, subject to prior review and affirmative approval by the Board of Trustees."

#2: "Be it resolved that Divine Word College dissolve the college-wide standing committee on Rank and Tenure as described in Section 267 of the Administration Manual and make any associated changes contained therein, mutatis mutandis. The effective date of this resolution will be 30 June 2019, subject to prior review and affirmative approval by the Board of Trustees."

#3: "Be it resolved that Divine Word College constitute a new college-wide standing committee on Faculty Promotions and Awards, composed of full-time faculty members elected by the Faculty Senate, whose primary responsibilities include the review and recommendation for approval or denial of applications for faculty promotions and awards for scholarly and creative achievement, and which reports to the Vice President for Academic Affairs. The effective date of this resolution will be 30 June 2019, subject to prior review and affirmative approval by the Board of Trustees."

Rationale:

- The stated purposes for tenure as defined in Section 251 of the Faculty Handbook are already being effectively accomplished at DWC with multi-year contracts, without recourse to the tenure mechanism: academic freedom, retention of qualified faculty, and security to concentrate on academic matters. This has been the case for many years.
- The general trend in US higher education seems to have been moving away from the tenure mechanism, and more towards multi-year contracts.
- For all intents and purposes, Divine Word College has already made the de facto transition to multi-year contracts for full-time faculty many years ago. Generally speaking, full-time

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faculty contracts are three-year renewable contracts. In some cases, however, one-year contacts are indicated for initial hires, temporary faculty, or in probationary situations.

- Recruitment and retention of qualified faculty has not been an issue at DWC.
- The only two current faculty members who hold tenure at Divine Word College will be retiring at the conclusion of the 2018-2019 academic year.
 - Dr. Marilyn Taylor, Associate Professor of English, began teaching at DWC in 1989 and was granted tenure by the Board of Trustees on 4 May 1996.
 - Dr. Joseph Hartel, Associate Professor of Philosophy, began teaching at DWC in 1991 and was granted tenure by the Board of Trustees 3 May 1997.
- There will be no tenured faculty remaining at Divine Word College after May 2019.
- No potentially eligible faculty have submitted a Statement of Intent to the Rank & Tenure Committee by the stipulated deadline of 15 October of the current academic year (nor apparently going back more than two decades).

Timeline:

- 25 January 25 February 2019 30-day faculty comment period
- 29 January 2019 VPAA presentation at Faculty Senate
- 26 February 2019 Consultative vote by Faculty Senate
- 22 March 2019 VPAA presentation and vote by Board of Administration
- April 2019 Forward all relevant documentation to Board of Trustees / Academic Affairs Committee
- May 2019 Presentation and final vote by Board of Trustees
- June 2019 Effective date for implementation (pending BOT approval)

The required Letter of Application and Service Report Portfolio of interested faculty are due to the Rank & Tenure Committee Chair no later than Friday, 1 February 2019. All eligible faculty are encouraged to apply!
