This week at Divine Word College, we are of two minds.



Distance Learning Ready Course Requirement for Fall 2020

Looking ahead to the beginning of next academic year, it is still not clear whether Divine Word College will be able to resume face-to-face classes or whether distance learning must continue. That firm decision might best be taken in mid-July based on the then-current public health emergency situation.

In order to plan for this contingency—and having consulted with the Department Chairs, the IELI Director, and the Board of Administration—I announce the following:

All undergraduate courses and all ESL courses for Fall 2020 will be required to be "distance learning ready" regardless of whether DWC resumes face-to-face classes or not.

Taking this decision now will allow all faculty sufficient time to prepare their course content within Populi before the beginning of the Fall Semester / Terms A & B in August 2020.

Distance learning ready courses should be built within Populi as asynchronous, but may be delivered in an asynchronous or synchronous manner depending upon circumstances.

A DRAFT Course Development Guide is being assembled to assist faculty in this process. Courses will need to meet certain guidelines, for example: specified number of lessons depending upon course credit/contact hours; lessons with structured content such as learning objective, reading, homework, other learning activities, and quiz; opportunities for faculty to interact with students either individually or as a group by Zoom; and, required faculty availability for scheduled virtual office hours. Kindly check your DWC email accounts regularly during the summer for updates.

College Blessed With Generous Bequests

Mary Ann Heles was born, raised and lived all of her life in Dubuque. She never married, but worked hard all of her life so she could give back to others. She always put the needs of others before her own.

Mary Ann came to know Divine Word College students when she went to the First Congregational Church for Thursday night meals. Because of that connection with our students, Mary Ann generously left a gift of nearly \$7000 to Divine Word College in her will.



Mary Ann is not the only person to remember the College. So far this year, twelve generous benefactors have left DWC more than \$1.8 million in total bequest gifts specified in their wills. The gifts have come from Michigan, Minnesota, Nebraska, Texas and throughout Iowa. They were given to the college by men and women who believed strongly in the need to prepare our students for life as Catholic missionaries.

The gifts received this year will help pay for several much-needed projects. First, the roof on the main college building will be replaced this summer. We are able to complete this project because the \$1,000,000 cost is covered by bequest gifts. Second, the re-siding of Megan Hall, at a cost of more than \$100,000, will also be paid for with bequest gifts.

The remainder of our bequest gifts will go to the college endowment fund. For more than 30 years, the endowment fund has provided necessary income for the college to help with various expenses, especially for student scholarships.

As you can see, many people throughout the United States want to help share God's Word through the ministry of our students. Our benefactors generously remember the college with their kind gifts. Let us remember all of our benefactors, deceased and living, in our daily prayers.

SOCIAL DISTANCE - 6 feet, 2 meters

It feels strange to keep a distance of about six feet from the person you are talking to, but doctors are strongly recommending that we do so when possible. It helps keep the COVID19 virus from spreading.

Different cultures have different expectations about how close you should be to another person. In the United States, the usual distance between intimate couples is between 0 and 20 inches (51cm). Family and friends usually leave between 1½ and 3feet (0.9 to 1.8 meters). For casual acquaintances and coworkers, more than 3 feet is expected.

Leaving six feet between us here at DWC feels strange! We live as a family at DWC, so as long as everyone is healthy, there is really no problem. However....

...in case we do have someone with a COVID19 infection on campus, then we will be more careful with keeping our distance. Besides, when we are finally free to leave the campus, people will still be expected, in public, to keep 6 feet from other persons. Until then, we can practice keeping a greater social distance from one another in two situations. *In the dining room*, we should try to keep 6ft between us in the food line. *In the chapel*, we can try to keep 6ft between us in the line to communion. There will be some marks on the floor to indicate 6ft. Can you keep your distance?

DUBUQUE COUNTY CONTINUES TO STAY AT HOME

On Monday, the Governor of Iowa allowed for restaurants, stores and other places of business to open in 77 of the 99 counties of Iowa. However, **DUBUQUE County is still restricted until at least May 15!** The peak number of new COVID19 infections in Iowa is expected between now and the end of next week.

As a result, the Board of Administration has decided to extend the "Stay on Campus" policy, and to extend the arrangements with employees for flextime and for working from remote locations. In a further effort to "practice" for the possibility that a COVID19 infection affects someone on campus or in the families of our employees, we ask that:

- For **employees who visit the College** for a work matter, please wear a facemask in the hallways where you may encounter members of the community.
- For **kitchen employees**, please wear a facemask when coming into the dining room where many of us are present.
- For workers in the business office, do not open the window at the front desk. Members of the community should send an email, telephone, or leave a note in the business office box to receive service.

Despite the Governor's decision to allow spiritual meetings to take place everywhere in the State, the four Catholic bishops of Iowa have decided to **wait before allowing public Masses**.

As we look to the end of this *unusual* semester, I am grateful for the adaptability and flexibility of the entire community. We are continuing to adapt as we look to a very *unusual* summer at DWC.

REMOTE and FLEX-TIME WORK

Employees working at home and/or on flex-time may extend their agreements until May 31st. Please contact your supervisor. Employees who come to the College are asked to wear a facemask when in contact with students and SVDs.

SUMMER PLANS

Stay-On-Campus. The "stay on campus" policy remains in effect for those remaining at the College for the summer months. This policy will continue until further instructions are issued by public health authorities.

Two-Plus-Two Policy. In general, all students on campus for the summer are expected to follow a 2+2 rule: two hours/day for community service, two hours/day for study. A number of non-credit learning activities will be offered for students who wish to participate in workshops, book clubs, film festivals, etc. Students taking ESL classes will also do community service. Students employed by the college should look to participate in organized learning activities as possible and through reading.

For New Novices. Following the directions of the Provincial and his council, the DWC students who have been accepted to the Novitiate will remain at DWC for the summer until they go to Techny on July 21, 2020. They will follow the same guidance as other students on campus.

For SVDs. In general, SVDs will not be able to take vacations while the stay-on-campus policy is in effect. Please see Fr. Thang for further consultation.

For Those Leaving Campus for Vacation or Work, they are not to return to the college campus until August 11.

FALL SEMESTER

The fall semester will begin on August 11.

- Before you arrive back at DWC you will be interviewed by telephone/email/texting to determine whether you are showing any symptoms of an infection.
- When students and SVD faculty arrive, they will be asked to respect a 14-day *college quarantine*, as we did after spring break. You will be asked to remain on campus to assure that we are free of COVID infections. The college picnic and all other events will be held on-campus.
- All classes are to be ready for distance learning in the fall. A final decision regarding face-to-face or distance-learning will be made sometime in July. In preparation, faculty are requested to develop all courses for a possible distance-learning mode.
